As I look up at the volume number above, I can hardly believe it has been 25 years since we started Hereford America. Although our actual 25th an-



It was quite a process but we finally received support from these states and Hereford America was born. We appreciate the support of our core states and others who continue to support our efforts. We remain the largest privately-owned Hereford publication in North America.

Our original corporation consisted of my parents, Byron and Pauline Bayers, my husband Marc and I. The four of us had some wonderful years traveling the United States and Canada, working together and building the newspaper. Sadly my

Belfield North Dakota rancher Rollie Baumgarten is a fourth generation registered Hereford breeder with an extensive family history in the state and with the breed. He and his wife Wendy, Isaiah and Ben, and his son Jake with fiancé Savannah and their son Theodore, run about 250 mother cows and 50 to 60 replacement heifers every year.

The Baumgarten family started farming in eastern North Dakota near Casselton in 1885. Another area farmer, Ben Hans, purchased his first registered Herefords in 1914. When his daughter Gertrude married Richard Baumgarten in 1921, Ben gave the couple a dowry gift of 10 bred Hereford heifers. The family has owned and raised registered Herefords for 107 years.

Carmichael Herefords Generations of Quality Herefords

Ranchers in western South Dakota and the surrounding area know that the Carmichael name stands for hard working cattle, real world cows, and they have been showing up to purchase the family's horned Hereford bulls for over 50 years. Keith Carmichael wouldn't have it any other way.

"We're coming up on our 53rd annual bull sale," Keith said. "About half go to cross on black cattle but we do have a lot of Hereford customers; about half of our bulls end up going back on Hereford cows."

The family has been in the area for over 100 years, with Keith's maternal grandparents, John and Gertrude Hartman homesteading in Perkins County in 1909. Keith's paternal grandparents, Pete and Garnet Carmichael, moved to Perkins County in the early 1940s, bringing their family and a herd of Hereford cattle from Gregory, South Dakota.

Pete Carmichael's son James and his wife Dorothy introduced registered Herefords to the herd in the late 1950s with a





It's a long tradition of working on and with the land to produce a harvest, tending to cattle that are both hardy and attractive.

Rollie got his start as a 10 year old when his father Hilbert gave him his first heifer calf to show in 4-H. Hilbert was a 4-H leader, so Rollie was active showing cattle in 4-H throughout his growing up years.

"That means I've had cows for 50 years," he laughed. "I guess that makes me old!"

Rollie's first wife, Tama Fisher, also grew up with registered Herefords,

helping her dad, Ted Fisher, on his ranch at the opposite end of North Dakota. When Ted passed away in 1986, the family took the opportunity to move themselves and their herd west to the rolling hills on the edge of the Badlands. Descendants of the Fisher cattle remain in the Baumgarten herd. In spite of the all too frequent droughts and the harsher environment of western North Dakota, the cattle thrive.

Rollie and Tama's two children, Jake and April, grew up helping on the ranch and showing cattle in 4-H and Junior Nationals. Sadly, Tama passed away in 2015, but the family has grown to

include Wendy and her two grandsons, Benjamin and Isaiah.

"The farm back east was pretty different," Rollie recalled. "A lot more mud and slop. It's not the greatest cattle country."

Selling registered Hereford bulls and showing cattle are both long-standing family traditions.

"My dad and grandfather held their first bull sale in 1949 — in a tent," Rollie said.

The tent blew over during the sale, making the event doubly memorable. After two years of selling bulls in a tent, Hilbert and Richard had sold enough bulls to build a sale barn and another barn. For many years, Hilbert and his brother Donny ran things together and took care of the cattle with Richard, but eventually they parted ways.

"Dad and I split things off on our own in 1974," Rollie said. "We just had a little bit different ideas about how to do things. Dad still had a few cows at home until he was close to 90. He always had a couple of cows around to take care of."

While the family originally bred only

horned Herefords, they currently raise some of both.

"Some of our customers want only horned cattle, some want only polled," Rollie said. "To some it doesn't matter a bit. My son, Jake, wanted to get into some polled bloodlines and it's been very helpful because we have customers who want both. To me it doesn't matter so long as they are good quality cattle."

The family has made a regular habit of showing their cattle, making trips to the National Western Stock Show in Denver, Colorado, almost every year since 1994. The work has paid off, with several prestigious awards on the shelf, including Grand Champion Carload of bulls in 2020, various class winners over the years, and Grand Champion Pen of Three heifers in 2009 and reserve champion in 2015.

"We do show, and we feel we've done well, but that's not our main focus," Rollie said. "We don't really raise show cattle. We strive to raise good cattle to sell to commercial producers who run in big pastures like we do. The carload award was great but I think it means

more to me to see other people do well with our cattle. Some heifers we've sold have gone on to do very well showing, including the 2016 Western States Hereford Show Grand Champion Heifer in Reno and the Champion Hereford Heifer at the 2014 HLSR. In 2019, BCC Dominator 619D, a bull we raised, sired the Supreme Champion Bull at the National Western Stock Show. In 2020 one of our herdsires, Haroldsons Upgrade 33D sired the Supreme Champion Bull over all breeds at the Cattlemen's Congress in Oklahoma City. I think that means more to me than the awards we have won."


The Stock Show kicks off the year for Baumgartens in January, and they get home just in time to start calving heifers. Or not.

"Sometimes we get our first calf the day after we get home," Jake said. "Sometimes it's the day before... We start calving the heifers the last week in January, and then have our annual bull sale the first Friday in February. Our mature cows start calving the 15th of February. In between feeding cows and pushing snow we try to haul some grain if we get the chance.'

With the operation including both grain farming and cattle there's never a slow moment on the ranch. By the end of March, Rollie and Jake are getting ready to get in the field and mending fences on the pastures. They seed approximately 3500 acres of wheat, corn, canola and sunflowers every year. Replacement heifers are AI'd April 20. Cows are AI'd in two groups, May 7 and June 1. They are also breeding a group of cows for fall calving now. They started using embryo transfer technology 20

years ago and they are excited to forge ahead with that technology as they see improved quality in their replacements and more consistency in the bulls they sell. "We've been

flushing five to seven donors every year and putting in 60-70 embryos,"



"I like to keep some extra females around," Rollie said. "I like to let them and the calves they raise tell me which are the good cows after their first year or two in production."

After the cows are AI'd they go straight to pasture, and by then it's time to start thinking about haying. With drought conditions persisting for the last couple of years, bulls have been pulled early to shorten up the breeding season. "We try to AI everything, then turn





F-1 baldies, only five percent or so are used on Hereford cows. Ten years ago it was a lot harder to sell a Hereford bull but there is a lot more interest now. We sell a lot of good bulls to folks who are not just customers, they are friends."

While the bulls get most of the press, it's the cows that are at the heart of everything Baumgartens do.

> "Our biggest focus in on our females," Rollie said. "The cowherd is the strength behind what we do. Both Jake and I look for longevity, for easy keeping, good uddered productive cows. These big pastures with their rolling hills, maybe only one water source in a mile, and with limited grass keep a cow herd hardy and functional."

bulls out for pasture breeding," Jake said. "We want the cows to calve in a 45-day window; every mature cow that is open in the fall gets sold. We've pulled them early the last few years and this year we don't have as many opens as in the past. I think it's really helped our fertility. A little management makes a big difference."

The fall cows start calving around August 20. It's been a lower stress management option than the January and February calves for Rollie and Jake.

"We really like calving without having to worry about the weather," Rollie said. "We are usually still having and in the middle of harvest, but for the most part it's gone smoothly. We check once a day, weigh and tag calves, and that's about it."

Bull calves are weaned right after Labor Day weekend; heifer calves around October 15. Market and feed supply dictate when steer calves are weaned and sold, so that can vary from year to year. In between harvesting wheat, doing fall projects, and harvesting corn and sunflowers, they run a fall heifer sale on the internet.

"This year it will be on October 13," Jake said. "We pick out some show prospects, some cow prospects; this fall we're offering 10 heifer calves and five bred heifers. They might go for show heifers or cow prospects or both."

By December, it's time to get ready for the bull sale and the stock show, and another year has rolled around. Bulls will be DNA tested this fall and enhanced EPDs run based on the DNA testing.

"Probably 75 percent of our bulls stay within a hundred mile radius," Jake said. "It's nice that they are close enough that we can go and see how they are doing for our customers. The majority of the bulls are used on commercial cattle, black cows or solid reds for producing

They have retained ownership in a few donor cows owned with other breeders so while their pace will be much slower, we are sure to see them around at a few events.

Congratulations Dimitri and Marina on a job well done and best wishes for your semi-retirement.





Carmichael calves are born starting in late March on through May. Then it's branding season; between working their own herds and trading work with neighbors it's not long until it's time to turn the bulls out and start haying. The black cows on the ranch get bred Hereford to produce F-1 baldies for commercial replacements. With changing seasons come fall shots, taking the bulls out, pregnancy testing cows, weaning calves.

"And then we feed cows all winter," Riley laughed.

Their goal is to produce bulls out of the type of cow their customers need: docile, moderate framed, easy keeping cows that can handle the harsh environment of the prairie, raise a good calf, breed back, and keep doing it for a decade or more.

"That's one of our big goals," Brice said, "To have cows that stay on the place till they are 12 or 13. It's sure nice having old cows; they are the ones that have paid

for themselves. We're always working to improve udders and eyes, and we try to keep a balance in milk: not too much, not too little. Docility is a pretty big deal to us too."

"We focus a lot on the maternal side," Keith said.

First cross baldies are marketed in October at Faith Livestock along with customers' calves sired by Carmichael bulls.

Bulls are sold at the ranch on the third Saturday in February. "We sell two sire groups of

yearling bulls," Keith said. "The rest are sold as two year olds. Most of these bulls stay within a 150 mile radius. We have very good support among our neighbors and the community. Hereford people are unique. They are old school and share the same fundamental values. It always seems that when you go to the sale barn you will find the Hereford people together." "We have really good cus-

tomers," Brice said. "We're thankful that they continue to support us."

been buying Carmichael bulls for almost as long as they have been offering them.

"Our family has been friends and neighbors with the Carmichaels for many years," Tim said. "My dad, Shelby Seim, and my uncle Wilford Seim bought bulls from them in the '60s. We started buying bulls in the early '70s, so we've been using them on our Hereford cows for about 60 years. The Carmichaels' word is good. They stand by their bulls and have generously helped to market our cattle in the past as well."

Mick Kennedy and family have been buying Carmichael bulls for years.

"I don't know how long, it's been that long," he said. "Jim was still in the business when we started buying Carmichael bulls. We keep going back because we've had such good luck with them. We run two herds of cows, and breed one Limousin for a terminal cross. But I like a baldy cow. We breed our black cows to Hereford bulls to get black baldy heifers to raise up for replacements."


Mick said that another positive factor for him is the distance.

It's inevitable that sometimes you'll have bad luck with a bull, he might break himself or get lame. Keith has always had something available for us to pick from when that happens, and I really appreciate that too."

Riley is thankful to be able to raise his family on the ranch where he grew up. His son, Hayzen likes to ride with Grandpa Keith in the side-by-side when it's time to check cows and bulls.

"When you look around at the way the world is going it's pretty awesome to be able to raise your kids the way you were raised in this western lifestyle," he said.

"This is the fifth generation running — from my grandpa to my grandkids — that the Carmichael name has been synonymous with Herefords," Keith said. "It doesn't happen all the time that the next generation wants to come back to the ranch. We are very blessed."





Robert Schnell

Robert Schnell was born November 17, 1930 in Dickinson, ND, to Ray and Clara Schnell. There were 13 siblings in his large family, two of whom died as children. Robert attended St. Patrick's Grade School and graduated from Dickinson High School in 1948. He graduated from North Dakota State University in 1952 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Animal Science. Robert served as Student Body President there from 1951 to 1952. After graduation, he enlisted in the U.S. Army during the Korean War. His infantry training was at Camp Roberts, CA. He eventually joined the Veterinary Corps serving as a meat inspector in Stockton, CA. It was there that he met Joan Jackson. Joan was working a summer job between semesters at UCLA as a lifeguard at the Stockton public swimming pool and Robert was smitten! He spent many hours there and Robert often joked later about fighting the Korean War at the Stockton Swimming Pool.

Robert was honorably discharged from the army in 1955 and married Joan (Jackson) Schnell that same year in Stockton, CA. Robert and Joan settled on the ranch north of Lemmon, SD. Besides raising their four children there (Karen, Leigh Anne, Eric and Carter), they also raised registered and commercial Hereford cattle. In addition, together with several of his brothers and father, Robert was a partner in the Schnell Livestock

Markets in Dickinson, ND, Miles City, MT and Lemmon, SD. He started his auctioneering career in 1955 at the Dickinson Market and later honed his skills at the Miles City and Lemmon locations. He began his purebred livestock auctioneering business in 1956. That business grew to include cattle sales in 23 states and Canada. Robert also was selected to be the auctioneer at national breed auctions in Denver, Calgary and Regina. The highlight of his auctioneering career was in 1968 when he was named the World Champion Auctioneer.

After Joan and Robert's divorce in 1974, they continued ranch operations together with the help of their son, Carter. Robert added a registered Angus herd in 1979 and registered Salers cattle imported from France and Canada in 1985. After he sold his half ownership of the Lemmon ranch to Carter, he moved to Rapid City and continued raising cattle on leased land near there from 1988 to 2005. He never stopped loving the Lemmon ranch and returned most summers to spray weeds for Joan and Carter. He hated certain weeds with a passion, leafy spurge and Canada thistle to name a few.

Robert was an avid outdoorsman and hiker. During the last 15 years he spent in the Black Hills, he never missed an opportunity to explore them with his beloved companion, Phyllis Bergeron. Much of his time during his final years in Rapid City was spent reading. He had an extensive collection of books and shopping for a Christmas or birthday gift for him usually included the purchase of a new historical non-fiction book.

Worth noting are some of the offices held by Robert which include his positions as President of the American Salers Association in 1988 and President of the World Salers Federation in 1989. Robert was named to the Marketeers Hall of Fame in 1990. The ranch near Lemmon, which he was so proud of, was honored by being selected to host an American Society for Range Management annual tour. It also was the recipient of the 1969 Adams County Soil Conservation award.

Robert Daniel Schnell died on April 14, 2021 in Rapid City, South Dakota, at the age of 90. He is survived by his children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, two brothers, one sister and a host of nieces and nephews. A burial and Celebration of Life service was held for Robert on July 12, 2021. 





Tony Stroh


