# **Rausch Herefords To Be Honored by AHA**

Brothers Vern and Jerry Rausch will join their father, William Rausch, in the Hereford Hall of Fame this year. They are honored by this recognition from their peers for a lifetime of work in the Hereford cattle industry. They were more or less born into the Hereford business and have spent their lives working together on the Rausch Hereford Ranch near Hoven, SD.

"I was four and Jerry was two when the first registered Herefords came here," Vern said. "There were 10 of us kids, seven boys and three girls. Jerry and I are the youngest of the boys. As the older ones got married, they each did an internship with dad but then went on to their own farms. Jerry and I are still here on the home ranch."

The Rausch family has a long history



of involvement in the cattle business. From the time their greatgreat grandfather homesteaded in the area, each generation has worked with livestock, and this continues now with Vern and Jerry's grandchildren and great-grandchildren. "The regis-



## **Building Hereford's Successful Future: Young breeders embrace** opportunity at the breed's inaugural Seedstock Academy

KANSAS CITY, Mo. – "Being a young producer in the breed, this is a really important time to get a broad perspective on what the industry is doing as a whole and all of the different dynamics within the Hereford breed," says Jacob Rausch, Rausch Herefords, Hoven, SD.

"That way, when I'm back home at my operation, I'm taking all of those things into consideration. I'm not getting tunnel vision or pigeonholing myself. It's going to create an opportunity for more success."

Rausch was one of six young Hereford breeders selected to attend the American Hereford Association's (AHA) first Seedstock Academy, an intensive week-long opportunity in September to learn more about current beef industry dynamics, to network and share ideas with other seedstock and commercial producers.

"As a young breeder, it's exciting to see what we can do to further improve this breed. It's been really nice to branch off and see the different environments people operate in, but all come together and talk about the value of Hereford cattle throughout the United States," says Shayne Wiese, Wiese and Sons, Manning, IA. "The connections alone, and the camaraderie has been outstanding. Also, getting a crash course into a lot of these Association programs is very, very helpful to me."

"It is a really great learning experience, not just for what we can do better every day, but how we can think through things and make things better for the long term," says Emilee Holt, NJW Polled Herefords, Decker, MT. "The Seedstock Academy multiplied a normal learning experience by 10. The people you were surrounded with multiplied that times another five."

#### **Designed with Intention**

"The Hereford Seedstock Academy is the logical extension of the breed's intentional leadership development, which is a key part of the AHA's strategic plan," explains Jack Ward, AHA executive vice president. "Members of the Seedstock Academy have already established themselves as high-achieving individuals with years of committed Hereford seedstock production experience despite their young age."

Shane Bedwell, AHA chief operating officer and director of breed improvement emphasizes the week's curriculum was designed to provide participants tools and information to benefit their operations, their customers and the Hereford breed.

In-depth discussion areas and tours included: the breed's National Reference Sire Program (NSRP) at Olsen Ranches, Harrisburg, NE, the breed's mainstay NRSP herd; visits with leading commercial cow-calf producers, stocker operators and cattle feeders; insight to the pioneering AHA collaborative sustainability research project with AgNext and Colorado State University; Hen House Local Markets, a premier

"I come from the commercial side of the business, and I happen to raise registered cattle. For these young Hereford breeders to grasp what's going on every day in the commercial part of our business is huge," says Bill Goehring, AHA president. "These young leaders had the opportunity to delve into key facets of each commercial sector during the week and what that means to their operation, their commercial bull customers and the breed." Goehring and his family raise Hereford seedstock, run commercial cows and operate a sale barn near Libertyville, Iowa.

"This group was amazing," Bedwell says. "Their ideas, their openness, their willingness to share their thoughts. It was apparent that this breed is on a powerful trajectory with the talent that we have in this class."

"I'm really excited about the work we're doing as a breed and breed association to capitalize on the breed's advantages in crossbreeding, and the research we are doing to keep ahead of the curve when it comes to consumer concerns about sustainability," explains Tyler Schultz, Sandhill Farms, Haviland, KS. "I've been a part of a lot of different young stockman groups, but to have one with people in the same business as me is rare."

After a year of hard work, they are looking to make a name for themselves in the Hi-Line, with the goal of better serving the Montana agriculture community.

Last month, the Hi-Line Harvest Festival took place in the town of Chester. Prairie Meats hosted a steak competition during the event.

"The steak competition is a collection of the best steaks that went through Prairie Meats this year in 2023," said Clark Diemert. We started collecting October 15th at the open house. From there, we got up to 14 steaks. My criteria being good fed beef."

More than 100 people showed up, with several judges determining the best quality steaks.

Brett Henke has seen Prairie Meats grow over the last year and spoke on the Diemerts' success.

"It's been really cool to see it start out from start to finish," Henke said. "He (Clark) had this idea a few years ago, and now it's actually an operating


Don will long be remembered for his orneriness, his signature cowboy hat and cigar, his passion for cattle and horses but most of all his dedication to his family and friends.

## Six Decades of Success: UW Celebrates Outstanding Alumnus Roger Stuber

Sixty-one years after his graduation from University of Wyoming, Roger Stuber is receiving the UW College of Agriculture, Life Sciences and Natural Resources Outstanding Alumni Award for his contributions to the cattle industry. This award was presented to Stuber and other awardees on Oct. 5 during the 2023 Ag Appreciation weekend.

#### Roger Stuber 2023 Outstanding Alumnus

All through elementary and high school, Roger Stuber wanted to be a lawyer. In fact, that's what brought him to the University of Wyoming in the first place. Stuber grew up in Bowman, ND, on the ranch his grandfather established in 1909. He chose UW because it offered the only program where he could get an animal science degree and start in the college of law without first completing a Bachelor of Science.

Stuber graduated UW in 1962 with a degree in animal science and an emphasis in business administration (just a few classes short of a double major). He was the first member of his family to graduate college. He averaged nearly 20 credit hours a semester and was the valedictorian of his class.

After the graduation ceremony, Stuber's father asked to ride back to North Dakota with him. About 20 miles north of Laramie, his father asked, "What would it take to get you to come back to the ranch?"

"You'd have to buy me 40 registered Hereford heifers," replied Stuber. His father agreed without hesitating.

Stuber returned to work on the Stuber Hereford Ranch, and in 1969, he helped put together the ranch's first bull sale. In 1972, he and his brother Dick purchased the ranch from their father.

#### **The Power of Electives**

The truth is, it wasn't hard to convince Stuber to come home. Law, he'd found out, did not allow much for innovation, and going over the same cases time and time again bored him. He was more excited about what he'd learned

The class wasn't part of his animal science curriculum. He signed up after a challenge from other members of the ATO fraternity. They had teased that it was easy to get good grades in the College of Agriculture. "I asked my advisor to let me take this zoology class with those guys," says Stuber. "I never studied so hard — but it did shut them up."

Stuber suggests current students to take the courses they're interested in, even if those courses aren't exactly standard practice for their major. His advisor, Paul Stratton, often questioned the classes he wanted to take, but Stuber says, "I wouldn't have the success I've had today without that education." From balancing a checkbook to understanding cutting-edge genetic research, Stuber's elective courses have served him well over the years.

Stuber also expresses gratitude for other aspects of his education. "Looking back, there wasn't a professor in

*(continued from page 9)* my animal science program that I don't have the utmost respect for," he says.

#### **Genetic Excellence**

With characteristic understatement, when asked about his accomplishments, Stuber admits his cattle have been "pretty well received."

Stuber Hereford Ranch (SHR) cattle have been sold throughout the U.S. and have even been exported to countries as far away as Argentina and Kazakhstan.

Within the U.S., SHR has raised and owned bulls that have been at the top of almost every expected progeny difference (EPD) category at the American Hereford Association.

SHR bulls have also won the National Western Stock Show twice. This competition is based on phenotype, genetics, and aesthetic appeal. In 1986, they produced Grand Champion SR Verdict 455, and in 2020 they won again with SR Dominate 308F ET.

SHR held its 55th annual bull sale in April 2023. Much of the ranch's success as a genetic leader in breeding Hereford cattle can be attributed to Stuber's leadership.

#### Legislative Accomplishments

In addition to leading his own business, Stuber has also been involved with state, national, and international legislation in the cattle industry throughout his career.

In 1985, the Beef Checkoff program passed as part of the 1985 Farm Bill. Under the Beef Checkoff program, which still exists today, producers and beef importers pay a dollar to assess each animal they market or import. Half of these funds go to the national program, and half stay in the state.

At the time, Stuber was the vice president of the National Cattlemen's Association, which has since become the National Cattlemen's Beef Association. After the Checkoff passed, four national industry organizations put together a meet-

ing in Chicago to allocate the money. Three hours into the meeting, nothing had been resolved. The organizations couldn't agree on what to fund.

At the end of another inconclusive meeting with NCA president-elect Jimmie Wilson, Stuber suggested that they write a proposal for a long-range plan for the U.S. beef industry. Rather than fighting amongst themselves, they could focus on what the industry needed, with input from customers up to producers.



#### **International Agreements**


Stuber's contributions didn't stop at national legislation. In 1993, as president of the National Cattlemen's Association, he participated in the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) in Geneva, Switzerland. Cattlemen had a lot to gain if the agreement was passed, including better access to global markets and higher profits due to reduced tariffs.

Near the end of the session, former

Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy gathered cattlemen from several different organizations into a room. He told them that President Clinton and the Australian prime minister had decided to remove the quota on imports of New Zealand and Australian beef.

As other cattlemen started to debate with Espy, he came over to Stuber and asked his position. Stuber had to think

fast. It was 2:30 a.m. in Washington, D.C., and he had no one to consult with. He said, "My organization speaks for the cattle industry. We will go along with you getting rid of the quota, but the reduction in tariffs must stay in place and the in-quota tariff of 3% must stay."

Espy agreed. A few hours later, he was flying back to Washington D.C. The principles of the GATT would later become the backbone of the World Trade Organization.

#### **Six Decades of Distinction**

Stuber has met four different presidents, served on the boards of several prestigious national and state organizations, and won a multitude of awards over the course of his career. He was inducted into the American Hereford Association Hall of Fame (2014), named Agriculturalist of the Year in 1980 by the NDSU Saddle & Sirloin Club and received the BEEF Magazine Trailblazer Award in 1993.

Sixty-one years later, Stuber's unique contributions to the U.S. cattle industry demonstrate just what you can do with a UW education. He continues to own and operate Stuber Hereford Ranch along with members of his brother's family. He's still running the ranch, still playing a leadership role in his community, still proving that he can adapt to just about any challenge.



(continued from page 1) ness is a labor intensive business, with with all the record keeping, performance data you have to catch, and the individual treatment of the animals," Vern said. "The question always came up to dad, 'Where do you get the help?' Dad always told them, 'We raise it."

"Dad always said that the more boys he had, the more cows he needed to keep them out of trouble," Jerry chuckled.

Vern and Jerry officially became partners with William in 1970. Now it's another generation's turn; the brothers sold the corporation a year ago, and six of their sons and grandsons currently make up the full time Rausch Hereford crew, with several other young men in the family helping part time as needed.

Vern and Jerry's older siblings initiated the registered Hereford herd in 1946. They talked their parents into



customers over the years. He was active in state and national beef and Hereford issues as well.

allowing them to sell their registered 4-H sheep and use the proceeds to buy some heifer calves.

"They each bought one or two as they had the funds, and dad bought 10," Vern said. "He said he had to take care of his to take care of ours; that was how the herd grew."

After age 10, the Rausch children earned cows for their labor. Over their growing up years, each worker earned a herd of cows that they could sell when they went to college if they needed the money, or could hang onto for leverage to get a start in farming when they were ready.

William remained a silent partner in the operation and mentor in the business after he moved to town.

"Older ranchers would come to buy bulls, and they would believe him, but not us young guys in those days," Vern said. "He could sell bulls better than we could because of his experience. We learned from that; we learned to earn our customers' trust."

Customer demand has pushed the shift from horned Herefords to a com-

bination of horned and polled genetics in the Rausch herd.

"Horned Herefords dominated the industry for a long time; the polled trait was a mutation," Vern said. "The polled breed is not as old as the horned, but polled is dominant so breeders could make progress fast. Polled cattle started out behind the horned cattle in quality; today they are caught up. On

the rail you can't pick them out in any way."

"Initially we started crossing polled bulls on our horned cows; eventually we ended up with about three fourths of the herd polled and the other fourth of the cows are horned," Jerry said. "Today it is easier to sell polled cattle to most people — not everyone, but most people. About three fourths of our customers want polled cattle so that's what we have. We dehorn, so they all look alike."

"Horns have some advantage," Vern said. "If a cow gets stuck in the mud you can rope her horns and drag her out without choking her down or tie an animal to the pickup to treat it. When we were young, there were no such things as ear tags or chains; for identification we branded the animal's tattoo number in the horn. With our modern chutes, handling the cattle works better without horns."

For 43 years, Rausch Herefords has led the U.S. in Hereford Dams of Distinction. From William Rausch's early performance tracking using a scale pro-

vided by the local Extension Service, to test piloting several software record systems, the family has kept abreast of technology and improvements. Yet both Vern and Jerry attribute some of the herd's outstanding dam records to doing things the old fashioned way: turning bulls out to service most of the cows every year, rather than pushing a strong AI program.

"We've had the most Dams of Distinction in America since 1980, so it seems to be working fairly well," Jerry said. "We have AI'd all of the yearling heifers for the last 10 years or so, and now the young boys are going further with it and AIing some cows too. They have the labor and the energy to expand the AI program; it was easier for Vern and me to just turn the bulls out. The biggest share of cattle are natural bred here yet."

"For a cow to be designated a Dam of Distinction, she has to meet certain criteria, such as having a calf every year in less than a 370 day calving interval, raising at least four calves, and those calves' weaning weights have to average five percent above the average of their contemporaries in the herd. It takes consistency, and they have to have the right environment to work in too, to give that cow the opportunity and ability to produce. We attribute a lot of that to natural breeding."

Jerry and Vern have expanded the herd from around 300 head in 1970 to over 1,000 cows. The operation has always been a larger family business and continues to be.

"We assumed the responsibility of marketing our older brothers' herds," Vern said. "We came up with a formula that has worked since 1965; the more the bulls brought the more we paid for the next year's calf crop. They increased and improved their herds over time too. As our older brothers have passed away, their estates have been leased to the younger generation. It is now under one management rather than several, but we have had one marketing program that Jerry and I have managed, so we have had all the sale responsibilities."

Managing an operation with multiple financial interests is made easier with technology.

"We're just blessed to have a legacy of working together as brothers on neighboring farms, and to be able to pass that legacy down to another generation," Vern said. "It required adaptation to today's world, to the corporate world for protection, the need for limited liability, and keeping up with the demands of technology. We have software to ID each person's standings, we keep track of which herd bull the cows are with and what pasture location the cattle are in at all times, if one is sold or dies, and at the end of the year we have a reconciling of all members that have cows in the herd."

The Rausch cow herd has about 10 different bloodlines, with approximately 100 cows per line.

"They all compete with each other

through the performance test that we run," Vern said. "We always have a bloodline going out every year and a new one coming in so that we can offer new genetics to our repeat customers."

Vern said that they have traditionally calved in the spring.

"We always tried to be in sync with Mother Nature and get the best effi-

ciency out of the cow herd this way," he said. "Now with the larger work force, the boys want to try some fall calving, so they are experimenting with that, and they are planning to fall breed a little over 100 head. They're young and they have the labor and the energy to make it work."

Vern said that typically they have about 150 bulls in their annual sale. About a third of these bulls are yearlings, with two thirds selling as two year olds. They will usually sell another 50-70 bulls private treaty throughout the summer.

"We steer pretty heavy out of this herd," he said. "Only one out of three male calves make the bull pen; the others go to the steer pen. We background all of our steers and either sell them around 800 pounds or send them to a feed vard."

One hundred fifty to 180 heifers are kept back for replacements every year, and 200-230 of the next cut sell as commercial heifers at the bull sale; they can be registered if a buyer chooses to do so.

"We select for growth and fertility, for problem free cattle," Vern said. "They have to earn their way around here. With this size herd, people can come in and prospect; they can find show cattle, rugged range cattle, and high performance cattle."

"We strive for a lot of eye pigment and a lot of red on the animals," Jerry said. "We find that is something that both purebred and commercial customers want. We like to sell to registered breeders, but we love our commercial customers. They come back more often and need more bulls, so we cater to them as much as we can. Ninety percent or more of our customers are commercial cattlemen."

Vern and his wife, Sharon, have been married for 58 years; Jerry and Vicki have been married 56 years. They are enjoying watching their grandchildren build families and continue building the Rausch Hereford business.

"We married very hard working and talented sisters and have lived on the same ranch for over 56 years," Jerry said. "After growing our families up together, now we get to watch another generation. By Christmas, we will have 13 little ones all under four, most of which are here on the ranch. Every tractor has usually got one or two of them along."

"These young men are starting out in life, most of them are married and have little families," Vern said. "They have gone out into the world long enough to know they want to come back. We're pleased to have them home on the ranch with their energy and talent. It's time for us to get out of the way and let them see what they can do. We get to enjoy watching them and helping them now.'

Rausch Herefords will hold their 66th annual bull sale at the ranch west of Hoven on Presidents' Day, the third Monday of February, 2024.

"We have worked hard to make a pretty good herd of cattle over the years and we hope these young guys can take it and make it better," Jerry said. "I'm sure they will. We have a lot of faith in them to continue what has been started and make the herd better yet."




