The smell of fresh shavings covered by the smoke from the firing muskets opened the 2014 Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE). Opening ceremonies were held in the Equine Arena of the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex on

July 7, 2014. Rich American history came to life for the NJHE exhibitors and supporters with an action driven Civil War reenactment. This year's NJHE was held July 5-12 in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania and was graciously hosted by six of the northeastern states. Those

states included: Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia.

The action following opening ceremonies did not stop, as 610 members of the National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) exhibitors, which hailed

Grandin on Management and Facilities — The "Magic" Combination for Cattle Handling

"Facilities are only half the equation. The other half is the behavior and management side of livestock handling. Too often people want the magic thing that will solve all their problems rather than looking at management," began renowned livestock handler Temple Grandin during her presentation in Rapid City, SD on July 1.

Grandin went on to discuss several factors from both the facility and management perspectives that can impact

livestock handling, and be improved upon in practically every situation.

"A big concern I have in genetic selection is we're just going crazy - we have genomic EPDs and we can analyze data. Now you have power tools to make genetic selections more quickly, but you have to be careful with power tools because you can cut your hand off a lot faster with a circular saw than with a hand saw," noted Grandin.

The biggest issue she has seen in recent years as a result of an increase in genetic



Grandin said the real secret to humane livestock handling is to prevent an issue from arising. Staying calm, not yelling or making sudden movements will result in cattle staying calm and working better.

selection data is a reduction in phenotypic appraisal of cattle, resulting in an upswing of foot and leg problems.

"Some say we don't have to visually

very critical times at the present, at General Motors, I think the most of the experts believe that she can handle it.

Over 45% of our executives of major corporations in the United States today are women and a big share of the big corporations in the world are now headed by lady chief executives.

Our state of Montana now has a woman Lt. Governor, not our first, but a very definite milestone. This woman grew up here, in our little town of Twin Bridges, a town of 400 people. She came from a family of small means. and worked each day at our one restaurant as a waitress, to save money for college. She was also a very hard working student in high school.

My wife Pauline and I were honored to have her as our server for several years when we went out to dinner. She worked her way through college, married, became a teacher, and later as head of our University system, then on to be Lt. Governor. A fine young woman who knew how to work, was dedicated, and relentless in her goal. Her name is Angela McLean.

This is a historic changing of times for women in America and in a big portion of the free world. We are seeing and have seen leaders in Great Britain, England, Germany and Israel that were powerful women leaders, and it would be hard to exclude Queen Elizabeth

who has so much effect on the British Empire.

In the Hereford realm we have so many women that have had a big effect on our leadership in the industry. This includes mothers, daughters, including Jill and Kathy Bayers, (Kathy is a key account manager at a major U.S. corporation, FMC), daughter in laws, (we have one, MaryAnn, a great wife and mother, of our granddaughter, and grandson, married to son, Rich. She is also a former school teacher and library assistant. She and Rich owned and operated Back Country Spraying.); sisters, granddaughters, wives, girlfriends and important helpers, some who have come from other parts of the world who are now helping cattle operations, managing or owning a ranch. We can look at our own Hereford America editor, Jill Bayers Hotchkiss, as one of the good examples. Jill has been editor of a major cattle publication for probably 20 years now and in the livestock publication industry for over 35 years; the second woman editor of Western Livestock Journal. The Hereford World publication editor is Angie Stump Denton and we have a member of the board of directors of the AHA, in a special lady by the name of Terri Barber, who could well become president of the AHA during her tour on the board. There are several other women editors of livestock publications in the U.S. at this time.

We have, at the present, and have

had in the past, several state association lady presidents, including our own state of Montana where Della Ehlke served as state president.

Most of the wives of Hereford breeders are very involved in the cattle business and they do a great amount of the work, physically, and in the offices, and making homes for their families. We also have to give tribute to the women in the industry that do the AI'ing, feed and show the cattle, take pictures, handle the videoing and telemarketing.

We haven't had any nationally recognized auctioneers but many years ago I tried to hire a lady auctioneer to help with one of our sales. She didn't feel like she was ready for that at the time, but we now have many young ladies breaking into auctioneering field, and one of these days soon we will have a lady auctioneer at a major sale.

The Hereford women groups have also been very active nationally in both the horned and polled breeds and recently they have merged into one group. Hereford women are very active in most states. For years, Montana had a very active group who supported all activities of show, sales, conventions, and field days. It was very unfortunate that as our older group of supporters gave way, our younger group had different priorities such as young kids, and outside jobs, and that seemed to lead to a somewhat less active group over the next few years. Through all the


were held, in most cases, the women in the family served lunch at the sales, besides all of their other tasks. Even the sales that are held today, that are catered, the women in the operation plan the food and manage the event.

My wife Pauline, was a city girl when I married her and never really got into the cattle work, but liked the cattle and the life style. She was named Hereford Woman of the Year in Montana in 1976 for her involvement in the industry. She provided music at our church for 40 years as well as a community chorale. Pauline was a wonderful mother and a great supporter. For 30 years she cooked for the summer ranch crew, which at times numbered a dozen.

We were audited by the IRS one year and the agent came to the ranch to go over things. One thing on his list was the food bill. I said to him, "Why don't you have lunch with us and we can talk more later." The agent thought that was great, so he sat down at the big table with 14 other ranch helpers, including Pauline and I. Pauline had made a huge plate of mashed potatoes to go with the beef, and they were passed around the table and all of the young helpers took a helping. The agent was next to last, just before me, and when the plate got to him, it was EMPTY! Pauline had more ready, but after lunch the agent said, "I guess I



#### 75 years of successfully breeding Herefords.

In those years I made many mistakes and learned some hard earned lessons. When I started, the country and economy was trying to recover from the "GREAT DEPRESSION". Many operations were financially broke. Banks were very careful with their loans if they were still in business. Ranchers did not dare make any mistakes. The Herefords varied quite a bit in size, but were fast getting bigger and heavier, so as to have something to sell. Along came World War II caused by a great deal of dissatisfaction among the people and a few greedy leaders wanting to steal value and territory. This was a time when the words "vultures" and "leeches" were heard quite often. After the war, the country had big Herefords. No breeder's Herefords really stood glaringly out. So, to gather attention, one breeder started breeding the "COMPREST" line with the promotion of earlier maturing, less feed and interest etc. etc. The academics and many breeders followed this line of thought. Other breeds in America were affected too. This was a FAD. This ended up with the Hereford breed wreck. I had been breeding Herefords about thirteen or fourteen years and doing everything "RIGHT". I picked up the good parts of my herd and decided to do my own thinking. After all, I had lost guite a bit of value. Airplane travel was getting more prevalent and the academics were traveling and brought back the idea of raising continental breeds. This took care of dwarfism but did bring in a lot of beef raising problems. Europeans eat very little beef, do very little open grazing, cattle are mostly raised and locked in a barn, have calving problems and on and on. Academics promoted multi colored cattle which caused no uniformity for the markets. This got to be a new FAD. I kept breeding Herefords for uniformity, beefiness, weight, and efficiency, in an attractive package. Along came the blacks that brought more uniformity in color and quality. Black is a fad. About this time our feeders topped the entire state of Nebraska for our weight of feeders. They continue to have good demand and sell well. And we continue to improve our registered cattle for sale. We do our own thinking and use our experience but with an open mind. We run a lot of Herefords for the number of people involved.

will drop the food issue!"

In our years of marketing we had 50 annual production sales. Pauline was here to help for 25 of them. She cooked and helped serve them, for some years as many as 800 people. She also organized the after sale function which was always held in our home. She was a great hostess. Ten years ago Pauline was stricken with Alzheimer's disease and for five vears I took care of her at home. Five years ago she was moved to an Alzheimer's care unit, in a nearby city, where she still resides. She cannot walk, doesn't talk much, and must be fed each meal. Hospice was called a year ago, but like a good ranch wife she still hangs on to life, the only thing she can still relate to is her music, which we play regularly for her. She hangs in there like she did with little frozen calves that came out of the blizzards and ended up in our kitchen for warmth and care. Only with her problem, there is no saving, it is just a matter of time. She is typical of the great ranch wives who dedicated their lives to family and to the cattle business.

A few years ago when Pauline was struggling, a customer of ours who had just sold their ranch, came to our house and said she and her husband

had moved to town, and she missed working with cattle, and being on the ranch, and would we have any work for her. I immediately hired her. Her husband is a famous sculptor, and wanted to keep working in that field. He has done work for Disney, and several pieces in various cities, including the airport at Sioux Falls, of Joe Foss, WW II hero and former Governor of South Dakota. Lynn has helped me now for five years, doing every kind of ranch work needed, cattle records and work with Hereford America. Another example of a very, talented, dedicated woman. We have so many great ones in this industry, similar to the ones I have mentioned. I am sorry that I cannot mention all of you here. You are a wonderful group!

You guys listen up. Take your favorite lady some flowers once in a while, take her to dinner (not just when you are going to a bull sale) make her feel that these thoughts are just for her. As the saying goes, "Smell the roses" once in a while. If you lose her, you will not believe how your world will change!

It was clear then that this woman lived in another world, and content to do so, but had the remarkable ability to get inside the mind of a cow. She has uncanny wisdom when it comes to cattle and cattle handling and is able to communicate this to ranchers in terms we understand, rather than completely scientific terms.

I marvelled then as I do now, at her abilities, insight and wisdom.

For those of you who are not familiar with Dr. Temple Grandin she is a world renowned livestock behaviorist, scientist, teacher, writer and designer of livestock handling equipment. When you see a circular tub, curved crowding pen or cattle handling equipment it was likely designed by her.

She is also an expert in the field of autism because she is considered a high-functioning autistic. Not only is she brilliant, she sees the world in pictures and somehow is able to communicate with cattle. What a unique individual! If you ever have the opportunity to hear her speak, do it. In this issue we have an article on Grandin written by Heather Hamilton Maude. It's really interesting. Be sure to read it and have your kids read it or watch her videos. I think if young people would study Grandin's research on cattle behavior it would make their life

in the cattle business a lot easier. Quiet handling of cattle with no yelling or screaming makes all the difference in the world. Not only do her teachings and practices apply to cattle handling but they also affect the outcome of the animal in terms of weight gain, fertility and overall health of the animal and therefore profitability for the producer.

Her official bio states the following: "Temple Grandin is one of the world's most accomplished and well-known adults with autism. She is a professor at Colorado State University and the author of several best-selling books, which have sold more than a million copies. The HBO movie based on her life, starring Claire Danes, received seven Emmy Awards.

Here is a humorous comment made by Grandin at a presentation on The Autistic Brain: "If we got rid of all the genetics that make autism we wouldn't have any computers. We wouldn't even have electricity!" This is the kind of blunt, yet interesting, comment Grandin throws out to her audiences. To say they are kept in rapt attention is an understatement. You can imagine how she handles a crowd of ranchers. It is priceless!

But the autism that makes her brilliant also caused her a lot of problems, especially early in life.

When she was new on the speaking circuit back in the 1980s she had trouble looking at people and the crowd.

Social interaction was difficult. Her incredibitly logical mind controlled her social behavior which made her appear different to the rest of us. When I see her today it is obvious, while she probably hasn't overcome this she has at least "managed" many of these issues. But with those things aside, this incredibly smart woman really has overcome a lot and today is in a league of her own in several highly specialized fields.

One of the fascinating comments she made in her Rapid City speech, which I completely agree with, addresses the increase of genetic selection based on EPDs, not phenotypic (how the animal looks) traits and some of the associated problems this might cause.

We have seen this coming over the last several years. With the great technical tools of EPDs, genetic testing, rapid proliferation of livestock reproduction through A.I. and E.T., videos,



appraise cattle, but we still need to do that. Cattle need to walk, and if someone said 10-20 years ago that we were going to get conformation lameness problems in cattle I would have said bull, but it's happening. Recently in a pen of all natural cattle, 10 percent were coming off the truck lame after a nice, one-hour ride to the packing plant. They came out of a nice, dry lot — it wasn't footrot, it was a conformation issue. Be careful with those things," she stated.

Single-trait selection is another issue within management that results in bigger-picture problems according to Grandin, with docility being among the most concerning.

"Selecting for temperament is a good thing, but when we go overboard we get into trouble and become worried about losing traits like mothering and foraging ability," she stated. "Let's look at the history of a breed, what are Salers for? They were originally a dairy cow raised in France who could get out and forage on the really rough and rugged hills. They were in close association with people twice a day and weren't being exposed to much novelty, so we never saw their temperament. Their genetic difference is getting out and up hills. Flatlander cattle won't go up hills like a Saler will, and the Saler is a tough mama. This is where there are trade-offs. If you're dealing with wolves, the Saler will fight. The Holstein would just say the wolf can have her calf – she'll give it to him. The animal that might be the best animal to fight off wolves might be the worst animal in the feedyard — don't over-select for any single trait," she reiterated.


Grandin noted that an animal's genetic temperament will show itself the first time they encounter something new or novel. However, that isn't to say positive reinforcement can't go a long way in improving even a nervous animal's ability to handle something new.


"An animal is a sensory based thing that remembers things in pictures. A man on a horse is a different picture than a man on a four-wheeler or a man on the ground. You should train your animals to tolerate a certain amount of different things before they ever leave your ranch. If you work them on horseback and they meet their first person on foot you will have a huge flight zone – that's dangerous in small pens at a sale barn or feedyard," she explained.

Taking the time to make a new experience a positive one is a great way to ensure an animal has a positive picture locked in their mind, and will be easier to work in that scenario in the future continued Grandin.

"There is a lot of interest in taking your young heifers and acclimating them to the corral by walking them through the chute and then feeding them something nice.

"Also, no dogs in the corral! A dog will train your cattle to kick, or shoot like a rocket ship into the lead-up alley. If you

Temple Grandin on the fact that while new and novel situations will always be potential stress situation for livestock, exposing them to a variety of working methods and situations while on the ranch will reduce their likelihood of throwing a fit when experiencing something new for the first time.

own a Blue Heeler, he needs to be put in the house while you work cattle in the corral," she stated as prime examples of how to make first experiences more positive.

Not yelling or making sudden movements were also mentioned, and Grandin said if people feel like they're hearing the same ol' thing, they are. "I keep saying the same things because people are still not doing them," she noted.

Staying calm in the back pen, not overloading that pen, and using following behavior were other suggestions Grandin provided to help keep cattle relaxed all the way through the squeeze chute.

"Wait until the single-file alley is half empty, then bring the next group up and they go right in. If you bring them up when the alley is full, they will all turn around. A basic animal behavior principle is that cattle want to go back to where they came from, and bad timing just makes them want to go to where they came from more, to a previous safe place," Grand explained, adding that making a singlefile alley long enough to hold more than two head will also aid in loading it via following behavior.

While proper management and facilities help, Grandin also noted that the animal's sensory memory is incredibly specific. Exposure to one situation in a positive fashion will not necessarily transfer to another.

"They can be tame in one situation and horrible somewhere else. People who hand feed or feed range cubes – those cows have a low flight zone when that's happening. It's the first time they see something novel, loud, and sudden that they show their genetics. However, animals that have never seen new things are more likely to become agitated at places like auctions, and that's even more important with genetically flighty animals," she commented on the fact that while not a "fix-all," exposure to different working methods, situations and items does generally help when novelty arises.

To determine how well a set of cattle, people and facilities works together in a low stress fashion, Grandin suggested recording handling measurements.

"You can only manage the things you measure. My idea with that is to get rid of the crazy. Five percent or less should vocalize in the chute and 10 percent or less should be moved with an electric prod. If you record that you can see if you're getting better or worse over time," explained Grandin, adding percentage of cattle that fall and the speed at which they exit the chute as additional points she suggested be measured.

Why take the time to measure? If the

desire to improve handling and make each cattle working experience easier on the livestock and humans isn't enough, Grandin suggested looking at the bottom line.

"Research shows that animals that zoom out of the squeeze chute gain less weight, and so do those that throw a fit in the chute. Quiet cattle gain more weight. Research also shows that things like acclimating heifers to handling situations will result in better conception rates. It's not complicated or unaffordable, and while things have gotten a lot better in the industry, we can still improve," she concluded.

Temple Grandin spoke on July 1 in Rapid City, South Dakota. Her presentation was hosted by South Dakota Farmers Union and South Dakota Extension.
