Woroniecki family raising Herefords for close to a century, honored by NDS

Looking to the future, the Agar family and the Durbin Creek Ranch are ready for the next challenge.

Circumstances have to align to create an opportunity. The opportunity has to be supported by action, and that action is what has created a successful operation for the Durbin Creek Ranch (DCR) and the Agar family of Huntington, OR and Thermopolis, WY. "If you would have told us we would be in the farming business last year I would have laughed, but as opportunity has it we are now in the hay farming business," said Mary Agar.

The Agar family consists of Bruce and Mary, who both were raised with strong Hereford influences. The Durbin Creek Ranch in Huntington, OR was purchased after Bruce and Mary were married in 1976. The couple wanted to expand their operation after they purchased a set of Hereford cows

with the intentions of getting into the bull business. Northeastern Washington had been home for both Bruce and Mary and they were focused on staying in the area. Unfortunately, the region did not lend itself to meeting their priorities of moderate winters that did not require cattle to be fed or provided additional supplementation. Therefore they purchased a ranch in the dry, and rugged country of

He was later assigned to fly the F-100 Fighter Bomber and assigned to Vietnam duty during that war on his first tour. Major Oberg flew over 200 missions during his tours in Vietnam. 



Peter "Pete" Atkins and his wife, Laura, and three sons, Scott, Craig and Paul, own and operate Atkins Herefords, Tea, SD.

Pete was raised on a diversified cattle, hog and crop farming operation in southeastern South Dakota, where he and his wife live today. His parents,

Alvin and Maguerite Atkins, purchased the family's first Herefords in 1971 and have had as many as 100 registered cows at their peak in size.

The Atkins family started collecting and reporting performance data in 1975 and have used artificial insemination (AI) since the late 1970s and embryo transfer (ET) for the past nine years.

Atkins Herefords' goal is to produce high-performing cattle with moderate birth weights that have eye appeal and will work for the commercial cattleman. Emphasis is placed on raising sound, trouble-free cattle, and udder quality in the cow herd is stressed heavily. Pete thinks it is important to use a balance of all tools available when selecting

breeding stock.

Today, Atkins Herefords consists of a base herd of 25 registered cows, and it produces an additional 20 to 50 ET calves each year. Together with their good friends and partners, the Jerry Delaney family, the Atkinses market bulls through a bull sale each year, and every other year they market females through a fall production sale.

In the year between female production sales, females are offered at their fall preview event, which includes a customer appreciation dinner and previews that year's calf crop along with the Denver prospects. Atkins Herefords consigns bulls and females to the Mile High Night Sale and exhibits carloads of bulls and pens of heifers with the Delaneys each year in Denver.


Pete has served as a board member and president of the South Dakota Hereford Association. He is a board member for the John Leibel Memorial Scholarship and has been the chairman of the Sioux Empire Farm Show Hereford sale committee since its inception 14 years ago. Jim Mickelson

Hereford breeder Jim Mickelson and his family own and operate Sonoma Mountain Herefords in the wine country of northern California. The Sonoma Mountain herd currently includes 175 head of registered Hereford cows.

In 2003, Sonoma Mountain Herefords got its start with the purchase of the remainder of the Kunde Herefords herd, which dated back to the 1940s.

Jim and his wife, Marcia, oversee the operation, while their son, Bobby and his wife Heidi, are in charge of day-to-day activities. Bobby is the ranch's herdsman. Jim and Marcia's daughter, Jamie, is involved as well and is responsible for management of the Hereford show string. The Mickelson family shows cattle at local, regional and national shows including the National Western Stock Show in Denver.

Bulls are marketed each year as long yearlings or 2-year-olds in the ranch's production sale, which has been held in conjunction with Lambert

Ranch for the past eight years. Select bulls are consigned to the Red Bluff Bull Sale where Sonoma Mountain has had several Grand and Reserve Champion bulls. Just recently the Mickelsons began marketing their females to commercial and registered breeders.

Sonoma Mountain Herefords has been a Gold Total Performance Record (TPR) Breeder for several years. In 2007 the operation was selected as the California Beef Cattle Improvement Association Seedstock Producer of the Year.

To educate the public, the Mickelsons operate sustainable tours in conjunction with their winery operation so that the public can see firsthand how their cattle are raised, including during calving season.

Jim also serves as president of Kunde

the California-Nevada Hereford Association president and participating on the polled and horned merger committee. He was a California-Nevada Junior Hereford Association advisor for several years and currently serves on the Western States Hereford Association show and sale committee

The cow herd includes about 300 cows. With the maturity of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres, the Schultz family is in an expansion phase. Through the use of ET, approximately 200 of the calves are registered, and the balance are purebred commercial. The commercial cows have been purebred

> Hereford since the mid-1940s.

The family has fed out its steers at commercial feedlots for the past 15-20 years. Feedlot performance data, as well as individual carcass data, have been collected and tracked.

The registered program was started after Kevin graduated from Kansas State University in 1986, and from then until 2008, all Sandhill bulls were sold private treaty. In 2008 the family started a spring bull sale. All 5-year-old cows that are pregnant with heifer calves sell in that sale. The Schultz family also sells commercial open heifers and customer-owned black baldy heifers each year in the sale.

Sandhill genetics have been part of the National Reference Sire Program (NRSP) and the Circle A Ranch heterosis project. Kevin uses these programs to increase the accuracy and predictability of his bulls and to identify outliers that will help move the breed in the desired direction. Sandhill Farms is a Gold TPR Breeder: the family has been

whole-herd reporting since the beginning of its registered cattle program.

Kevin's goals are to provide genetics that will enhance customer profits and satisfaction. In the past two sales, 70% of the bulls were sold to commercial buyers.

For the last 19 years, Sandhill Farms has exhibited a pen of bulls at the National Western Stock Show in Denver.


Kansas City Marriott Downtown, 200 West 12th Street, will host the event this year.



Poland in the early 1900s, and came to Hebron to work in the coal mine associated with the Hebron brick plant. He found out there was one L-shaped 160-acre homestead left out in Mercer County, and he filed on it. It had some clay buttes, deep creeks, and about 12 farmable acres when it was all said and done," began Florian's wife Gladys of how the Woroniecki's came to North Dakota.

Florian added that his mother Anna also came from Poland, but did not know his father prior to arriving in


"It was quite a surprise. A director of the North Dakota Stockmen's Association called – I had no idea they were even considering us. There are a lot of good ranches around, but they had to pick one out of our district, and through the years they knew how we operated and thought we deserved it. They didn't ask me first if I wanted it, they just said I had it. If theyhad asked first I probably would have said no." Florian Woroniecki's humbled response to being named North Dakota Stockmans Association's Rancher of the Year.

America. She moved to Belfield, ND, and somewhere between building a homestead shack and continuing to work in the coal mine certain times of the year, his father met his mother.

"They were married in 1914 and started raising their family of 12 on that homestead. In the beginning they mostly raised oats, probably had a milk cow and a few horses. They later had sheep because there was a big sheep ranch next door," explained Florian.

Over time Hereford cattle were added to the operation, until the family sold out of the sheep business in 1947, with the exception of a few head Joseph kept as his hobby, and went strictly into cattle.

"We had about 160 cows at the time



Joe (pictured here at the 2012 Stuber sale) is the fourth oldest of 12 kids, and is 93 years old today. Florian is the youngest, and is now 79. They were the two within their generation who returned to the ranch. Under their operation the ranch has grown steadily over time, creating opportunities for future generations of Woroniecki's to farm and ranch in Mercer County, North Dakota. we sold the sheep. Until the 1950s we would trail our cattle into the Hebron stock yards, which was about 12 miles then ship them by rail to south St. Paul, MN. Then we started trucking them to St. Paul and to local sale markets. Now we sell directly through our local sales ring," explained Florian.

In 1963 Florian's father passed away, at which time he and his brother Joe continued the partnership they began (continued on page 14)

with their father in the 1950s. Today the ranch is split between the two brothers, with Joe's half incorporating much of the crop and hay land, while Florian's encompasses the majority of the pastureland.

"A lot of the ranch's growth we credit to our neighbors, because they gave us first opportunity to acquire their lands that bordered us when they were selling. That was really a blessing that they were willing to give us first chance, and today our land is mostly joined as a result of that," explained Florian.

In addition many acres of native grassland that have never been plowed, Florian has been diligent in his conservation efforts, reseeding several former homesteads into grass as they have been added to the operation, installing multiple water pipeline and tank systems, and implementing a twice-over rotational grazing system designed to leave plenty of forage at the end of each grazing season. These changes and improvements helped the operation increase in efficiency and proper land use as it grew to its current 800 mother cow capacity.

"Our cows are still Herefords, they seem more manageable, docile and easier handling, plus they survive our winters well. We breed our twos and threes to low birthweight Angus bulls, then run those crossbred heifers with

our own until we pick our replacements. The black baldy heifers are then sold locally, and have turned into a nice cash crop for our operation," explained Gladys.

Cows calve in April and heifers in May each year — a change implemented by "the kids" and an adjustment from when Florian and Gladys were younger and calved heifers in February and cows in March. Steers are retained, backgrounded and sold as grass cattle at roughly one year of age.

We raised five kids on the ranch. Our two boys are here and have families of their own, and right now we have five grandsons that are between elementary and high school age — they're the workforce today. Our son Brent is on this place and involved heavily in the cattle part. Warren and his wife Jodie have their own cattle and Quarter Horse operation, in addition to running a feed business, but they also help a lot with the cattle," explained Gladys.

Longtime employee Jim Erickson was a part of the operation from 1967 until his death in the summer of 2014, and he and his wife raised six kids on the ranch, all of whom were also part of 'Florian's cattle crew."

"I wouldn't have it any other way when it comes to raising a family. It never made any difference if you were a son, daughter, granddaughter or nephew, if you could ride a horse you



That means he and his youngest grandson spending time together in the saddle, covering the ranch's semi-dry plains, buttes and creek bottoms, taking care of minor problems but calling in backup for big"We are also somewhat fair weather

riders anymore - we can get winter here, and it's not as fun as it once was to be out in those conditions, calving and whatnot. During the winter our cattle are out on pasture, near headquarters. We feed with a pickup or tractor, depending on conditions, and rely on the natural protection of our deep creeks. Waiting for green grass and warmer temperatures to calve has been alright," noted Florian.

One thing the couple still embraces is maintaining involvement in agriculture organizations, and sharing the tradition

of ranching and beef production whenever possible.

"Florian has been a member of North Dakota Cattlemen for 29 years, and I've been a member for 15 years in addition to being part of the North Dakota Cattlewomen and serving as their state president at one point. Through that I have been able to do different presentations in classrooms about beef and ranching, and we have hosted different groups on our ranch over the years. We like to carry on and let them know the tradition that is here and at the same time promote beef. So many people are so away from agriculture all they hear are the negative things on the media. If they get to know you one on one, and hear why you're doing this a certain way, it means a lot more to them than anything they might see on TV or Facebook," explained Gladys.

Going forward, the couple says they plan to continue with Florian's mindset that as ranchers they are responsible for growing grass, then using cattle to harvest that crop. They foresee at least some of their grandchildren taking an interest in ranching — the youngest at 10 has already declared it his future occupation, and see a bright future for their operation in that generation.

"The best part about ranching is being outside, seeing the livestock and wildlife that live on the land, and raising your kids that way," concluded Florian.

(continued from page 1) eastern Oregon near the Snake River. As the couple learned the land, they realized that the ranch in Huntington provided many opportunities, but still not meet all of their priorities. After a short time Bruce and Mary started to winter cattle between Moses Lake, WA and Montello, NV.

While the Huntington Ranch may have not been ideal for all aspects of running cattle, it served as the home place. Bruce and Mary raised their family of four: Heidi, Shelly, Wyatt and Jake on the ranch. The kids were involved with the ranch from an early age, and are still very involved. Currently, the ranch has grown to maintain three families. Today, Wyatt and Jake with their families are a critical part of the Durbin Creek Ranch. Wyatt and his wife Joey along with their three children manage the purebred cowherd. The youngest son, Jake and his wife Hannah manage the commercial cowherd and the Quarter Horse program. Between the four kids, Bruce and Mary are proud to be the grandparents of 10 grandchildren. "Our lifestyle is focused around our family, what to do to make a living, and being able to make it fun has paid off," said Mary. Throughout the year the grandkids are involved in the ranch, whether it's spring brandings, rodeos or showing cattle.

Maintaining the Huntington Ranch meant that the family had to be resourceful in running cattle. They identified the areas of what the land lacked, which created opportunities for networking and to expand the ranch. For nearly 20 years, weaned calves have gone to northern California with the Lasgotiy family for the winter. Following that move, yearlings are moved to Wallowa, Oregon or to Pinedale, Wyoming depending on the grasses. Cows that are maintained on the Oregon ranch will winter on cornstalks in south central Washington.

In early 2007, Bruce saw a newspaper advertisement for a ranch near Thermopolis, WY. After a few phone calls and a trip to Wyoming the decision was made to move the Red Angus based commercial herd along with the expanding registered Hereford herd to Wyoming. The Durbin Creek Ranch registered Quarter Horse program and Angus commercial cowherd would stay on the Huntington Ranch. "We are not locked into always doing the same things every year," said Bruce. "We are always looking to change and evolve our practices."

This year marked the seventh summer in Wyoming for the Agar family, and it has been an additional expansion of the ranches' diversity. The family is continually grateful for Bruce's classified newspaper find, as the cows in Wyoming no longer have to be moved off of the ranch during the winter months. The winter months in Thermopolis typically produce dry snow that allows the cows to push through and graze on native grasses. In 2013, Bruce recognized that there was limited hay put up in northern Wyoming, but the region had great potential to for hay acres. That summer some of the cows had been summered southwest of Thermopolis in the Pine Dale area. Following learning more about the area, they found ground with



good water resources to start a small haying operation. While the Agar family does not supplement their cattle with hay, the hay market continues to be good and they are taking advantage.

The registered Hereford cow program started as the foundation for the Durbin Creek Ranch, and in nearly 40 years the herd has evolved to fit the demands of the marketplace. Currently, the need for Hereford bulls has got Bruce and Mary back to the original goal of being in the bull business. Today, the couple's oldest son, Wyatt, oversees the daily operations and long term strategy for the purebred group. With this teamwork and look to the future they are focused on producing

purebred cows that are functional and bulls that exceed customers' expectations. The family will be holding their annual bull sale again this February.

Both sons were members of the National Junior Hereford Association and the Oregon Junior Hereford Association. Their experiences with the organization helped to create a network and a passion for purebred cattle. Wyatt's drive for enhancing and understanding genetic performance started at a young age. "He was really young when we noticed that he would analyze the genetics of the cattle and there hasn't been much that has changed over the years," said Mary. Throughout Wyatt's junior career he had many honors, but none were as big as winning the judging contest at his first field day when at the age of seven. That single experience launched him into a mindset of setting high expectations of himself and the type of cattle he wanted to produce.


Directly, for the last two decades the family has been dedicated to growing the herd, but only at the rate they know represents the quality genetics that perform to their standards. Today, the bull program is focused on producing only bulls that show the ability to grow and produce offspring without supplementation and can survive in the rugged terrain of the western United States. Wyatt has also created a grass index to rank the bulls based on performance.

The purebred cows are managed just as the commercial cows throughout the year. The cows are maintained in large breeding groups where multiple bulls are turned out. Following calving, DNA tests are administered for progeny. Agars feel this allows them to test the genetics and to see which bulls can truly cover cows in a working situation. A more recent addition to the herd's genetic battery is the aggressive embryo program. The donor program is focused

on cows that have longevity, shown the ability to perform in harsh environments, combine phenotypic and carcass traits that customers are demanding. The 2014 breeding season proved to be one the largest yet for the embryo transfer program, "setting cows up, and ensuring that all the steps have been taken for the best matings is additional labor and stress," said Bruce. "But it is sure worth it when we have seen so much quality being produced from this program."

The Agar family is continuing to challenge themselves and to see what the future may hold for the cattle industry. The family is dedicated to preserving the western lifestyle and creating action that drives opportunity for their cattle.







From South Dakota to Stranraer

COWBOY hat? Check. Lasoo? Check. Herding cattle? Check. It's not the usual sight you might see on the beautiful Stranraer coast, a man using a horse to herd cattle along the shore, but it's happening. Ty Hotchkiss travelled over from South Dakota in the US to work cattle and break horses for John Douglas at Mains of Airies, near Stranraer.

With clear-blue skies and glorious sunshine, you'd be forgiven for thinking we were actually in America as Ty managed to herd Hereford cattle along a precariously high and fine shoreline

He's been doing this all his life, meaning he's incredibly modest when the assembled Scots praise his skill.

So much so, when asked whether he could be called a cowboy, he said: "yes...or just a guy."

With that, he explained what he had been doing in the three months he has spent with the Douglas family: "There are eight Appaloosa horses here and I've started three of them – a sevenyear-old that hadn't been rode, a twoyear-old and a four-year-old. There's also a seven-year-old stud that had just been riding and I was continuing training."

A 10-year-old gelding and 18-yearold mare are also learning the work process. The Douglas family have been learning how to work cattle. "I've just been starting colts like I would anywhere else and the family have been getting out and riding with me. The cattle have adjusted really well considering they are used to being herded by quad bike or on foot."

John is clearly impressed by his helper and his eyes light up as he recites the new anecdotes he has gained from riding alongside the American.

With most farmers in Scotland choosing to herd cattle on foot or using quad bikes, it is a highly unusual idea to learn to use horses.

But it's one that makes a lot of sense as John explained: "I feel that in just two generations people in the UK have lost contact with horses. Before tractors came in, everyone could yoke a horse and in two generations we've lost that contact.

"Watching Ty working cattle is so relaxed, the cattle are not stressed. I watched him rope a calf to give it an injection and all the other cattle just stood by and watched. If that had been a motorbike they'd all have been running around, hiding in a corner.

"I'm hoping to keep it up, and I'm sure the girls will."

Before he came to help work on John's 170-strong Hereford cattle herd, Ty was travelling around America working horses.

Growing up on the family ranch in Northwest South Dakota he learned to lasso at aged five or six and used those skills at Mains of Airies when a cow needed an injection – much to John's delight.

"I've been working with horses all my life but I got my first pony when I was around five or six and I started training horses for the public when I was 14 and have continued to learn since," said Ty.

He has trained in Texas with the experienced hands at Ken Nichols Quarterhorses and in several ranches in Kansas and Idaho as well as travelling to China and New Zealand.

He typically works the horses from an early age: "We usually break horses at two and then we get them exposed to cattle at an early age.

"There isn't really a time for how long they take to break, and they are

learning their whole lives. However, they can be broke at five or six."

He met John in Kansas, while John's daughter Rosie was on a gap year and decided to visit her at a horse and cattle sale.

John had been travelling to the US for years buying embryos and was keen to have Ty over to Scotland and it has given him some thoughts for the future of his Appaloosa horses.

He said: "Ty is doing a great job, in the first week he had a two-year-old colt and three-year-old filly that had never had a halter on and was riding them about the field. The biggest thing for me is his patience with the horses.

"I like the idea of running a stud, the

demand would be there. I would be niche but I think if we had broken horses working cattle, people would like that. "I was surprised when

Ty came and was riding old Wynita – you'd think she had worked stock before and was really enjoying it."

As for Ty, who returned to South Dakota on October 10, he will spend a few days at home before heading to Kansas to get horses ready for a big sale.


