

WY and has also had experience in the Feedlot Industry. His experience on the Meat Judging team in college will certainly enhance his capabilities of evaluating cattle. I am very certain that Lander will be a very successful and popular addition to the Hereford Industry and that Lander will be most successful in this new venture.

It was also very interesting to me to read in the magazine, *Best of the West*, that Colonel Lander Nicodemus of Cheyenne, WY is a 2016 World Livestock Auctioneer Championship Qualifier for the event to be held in St. Onge, SD. It is amazing to me how many field representatives in the AHA have gone to be very successful Livestock Auctioneers. Best wishes in this endeavor to Lander.

I recently read an article in the Bloomberg Business Week magazine entitled "Fast Food Chains are Pigging Out." I have a friend in our local bank that I have lunch with periodically, and we visit about the livestock industry and the financing aspects of it as it relates to cattle. He has had very vast experience for a young man in that, after college graduation he worked in the commodities industry for a period of time. He is a Montana boy who wanted to return to Montana for his livelihood, so when he got the chance to be a bank executive in our local bank, he quickly accepted the challenge. The banker told me that he has a close friend who is still in commodities and my friend noted that there was a wide change in the buying habits in the meat industry, with beef purchases lowering and pork purchasing rising among the top restaurant chains in the US.

About a month later, the world economy took a vicious slide and the US economy and beef prices dropped at the same time. It seemed quite unusual to me that some of the so called experts were saying that the beef prices should hold through 2015 and into 2016. It seems like a lot of our so called experts missed this shot, too. In the October 12, edition of Bloomberg Business Week the article on restaurants states that McDonald's, Applebee's, Wendy's and Burger King are among the restaurants that are drawing in new customers because of a new demand for pork, with the higher beef price being a factor, on the menu promotion. The article goes on to state that even the chicken chain, Buffalo Wild Wings, has put a pulled pork sandwich in its menu. It's very interesting that the fast food business is constantly looking for something new to draw customers in, but I sometimes wonder if the fast food chains in their effort to sell a cheap meal sometimes go too far in how they cheapen the meal.

I eat quite often at fast food restaurants and my usual order is a burger sandwich, but I am very surprised at

the poor quality of the burger sandwich that some of the restaurants are providing. Though pork is now cheaper than beef, it has been my experience in life that supply and demand will adjust that figure somewhat as time goes on. But would not the consumer's experience be much better if they were to buy a very good tasty burger at a little more money, than the cheap burgers that are being offered to us that obviously have cheap fillers in them? I know that now 60% of beef is sold in the form of burger and some of that is due to cost. Another reason is that people simply love beef burgers when it is pure beef.

I do have to admire the fast food industry however for giving the American consumer in most restaurants a good satisfying meal for under \$5.00. Those beef burgers, at most American chains, are still what must be considered a best buy in our American economy today.

The Hereford female demand this past month at the sales in Montana. Holden, Churchill, Mohican-Ehlke-McMurry sales, were extremely incredible, as these sales were held when the international economy was in turmoil. As I stated in my last article, because a breeder has about 5 years invested when he buys a bull, a cow or a heifer, the breeder is making a long term commitment and so the purchasers of these purebred cattle want to buy the best that they can buy within their means, to have a high percentage chance that their new investment will be ultimately successful. These 3 sales indicated that future confidence is in a high degree. It was a case of, when people found what they wanted, they were willing to pay a higher price for that commodity. We will look forward to the coming bull sale season to be as successful as the female market has been throughout the US this fall.



Final Farewell...

Charles Eugene Boyd

Charles Eugene Boyd, 73, passed away on Sept. 30, 2015, at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington.

Mr. Boyd was born on Aug. 16, 1942, in Maysville, to the late Ward and Violet Boyd. His grandparents Eugene Asbury Boyd and Mae Wallingford Boyd served as influential people in laying the foundation for the cattle business as well as other aspects of the agriculture industry.

He graduated from Maysville High School in 1960, and attended the University of Kentucky. He was a member of the Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity, UK Livestock Judging Team and the Block and Bridle Organization. He returned home after college to farm and raise registered livestock. He was a third generation Hereford breeder.

Mr. Boyd was a member of Shannon United Methodist Church and attended May's Lick Christian Church and Highland Christian Church.

Throughout his life he had many accomplishments on local, state and national levels. He was inducted into the Mason County Alumni Hall of Fame in 2012; a founder of the Mason County Cattlemen's Association and its first president; recognized as the Kentucky Outstanding Young Farmer; Kentucky Cattleman's Association Seedstock

Producer of the Year; Founding Member Beef Advisory Committee for the North American Livestock Exposition; member of State Board of Agriculture under two administrations serving on his second term; Kentucky Hereford Association Past Director and President; Board of Directors American Hereford Association; and the American Hereford Association Hall of Fame. He was a prominent beef cattle judge at all major livestock shows, exhibited several International and National Champion Hereford cattle, and bred and raised over 20 bulls in major artificial insemination studs which is one of the most significant achievements of any Hereford breeder.

Family, loving others, and mentoring young people in the agriculture and Hereford industries were the way he lived his life.

Mr. Boyd is survived by his wife of 52 years, Martha Donovan Boyd of May's Lick; his children, Charlie II (Paula) of May's Lick, Suzanne (Andrew) Matheny of May's Lick; four grandchildren, Blake Boyd, Logan Boyd, Austin Matheny and Taylor Belle Matheny; one sister, Susan Hoag of Greenville, SC; one sister-in-law, Helen Donovan Thomas of Flemingsburg; and two nephews, Johnny and Jason Hoag both of Greenville, SC.

He was preceded in death by his

mother-in-law and father-in-law, Forrest and Lucy Donovan.

Douglas "Buddy" Leachman

"Buddy" Leachman passed away at the Riverside Health Complex, Turtleford, Saskatchewan age of 60 years.

Buddy was born May 25th, 1955 in Maidstone, Saskatchewan. He attended school in Maidstone, from 1961 to 1970, completing grades 1-9. He married Frances Oddan on November 5th, 1977. Frances attended school through grade 12 in both Marshall and Maidstone. Buddy and Frances had two boys, Lance and Tyler.

In 1962, Buddy's parents, Lloyd and Pam, moved to the ranch's current location in northwest Saskatchewan, about half an hour east of Lloydminster and 12 miles north of Maidstone, on Highway 21. Initially, the operation was comprised of 100 head of commercial cattle and involved grain farming. Purebred Herefords were added in 1967 and the "Big Gully Farm" was registered under the Home Act Department in 1968.

Mentors in Buddy's Hereford life were firstly his parents. He also recognizes George Ellis (Beartooth Ranch), Jonathon Fox (Justamere) and Herb He was one of the few to get off the train from Toronto's Royal Winter Fair to attend the very first CWA. Buddy travelled extensively across Canada and the United States to attend cattle shows and visit breeders in their yards, viewing their herds. He was also one of the first pioneers in Canada to implement an Internet Sale to sell Hereford seedstock.

Buddy imported bulls and females from the U.S. as well as sold live cattle to approximately nine U.S. states, Argentina and Inner Mongolia. He sold semen to approximately seven U.S. states, South Africa, Australia and Uruguay.

He enjoyed team roping in Saskatchewan and Alberta, ski-dooing locally, fishing the northern lakes and BC's Queen Charlotte Islands and the mountains.

Buddy leaves to mourn his passing: his wife, Frances; sons Lance (Shari) and Tyler (Amanda Renaud); his mother Pam; his brother Charlie (Sally) and their children Daegan (Joseph) Coyne, Ryan, and Allie; and his mother-inlaw, Agnes Oddan as well as numerous (continued on page ∅

"you drove right by our place. Next time, stop in!"

Well, honestly I don't think we drove right by their place but possibly within 5 or 10 miles of it, but we had no idea. Being lost in Ireland is fairly common but you always come out somewhere! It's not like being lost in South Dakota or Alberta where you could drive for a hundred miles, seeing very few people, before you realize it.

The island country of Ireland is only 174 miles wide and 302 miles long from north to south with over 3,000 miles of coastline. So travelling from north to south is about like me driving from home to Huron, SD, on the other side of the state.

Anyway, we had a great vacation in 2013 which included a lot of different activities, site-seeing and we found quite a few commercial Herefords along the way. Fabulous scenery and wonderful, friendly people are what set Ireland apart.

We saw quite a few herds with Charolais and Simmental crosses in the Galway area, then as we went farther south we started to see more baldies and Herefords. We were surprised how large the cattle were compared to ours, at least the ones we saw from the road. Realizing we had just done our own cattle tour without planning it, we decided to tour a registered Hereford herd the next time we went.

In our plans to go back to Ireland this past summer, I thought I'd better contact this person who said we drove right by their place. So a couple days before we left I contacted Anne Pounds and Liam Philpott of Allowdale Herefords to see if we could stop by for a visit and tour the herd. We had quite a chat on Facebook and quickly found out we were compatible. They said they'd like us to come by for a visit so we put them on our travel agenda.

Most addresses in Ireland are much different than those in the U.S., particularly in rural areas. We were amused to find out when we were in the town of Dingle the country had just passed a new law where each town would be required to have a zip code for the first time in history. The locals were scoffing at this

and of course the program was to cost \$27 million dollars over 10 years which they felt was a complete waste. We were amused because many of the non-city addresses don't even have numbers, just house name and a street. Well they know where it is, just find it! Until you realize this is their system, it is puzzling when making hotel reservations and trying to find a business or people out in the country. They probably laugh at us because those houses have been there for hundreds of years, many times the same family line has lived there for generations, compared to ours of only 200-300 years and people moving all the time. And I know the people who live there don't even think about this. Thank heaven for Google Maps!

We planned on visiting Allowdale after we'd been in the country for a few days, hoping jet lag might be on its way behind us, so we could carry on an intelligent conversation. We had stayed in the city of Limerick for the first few days, venturing out to several tourist areas and including a human pedigree search at one ancestral town. With the following address in hand, Knocknacolan, Kanturk, County Cork,

we headed in the direction of Kanturk, hoping we could find it. For you readers from the U.S. and other large countries, keep in mind the age and size of the roads in Ireland are quite different from most of ours. Many of the country roads are one lane and windy, with hedge rows or stone fences on each side of the road which prevents you from seeing very well. That's probably okay since you should be watching the road ahead of you anyway lest you run onto a biker, large truck or one of the locals driving faster than you. At this point I should say thank you to my sister, who was our driver during both of our trips. Since they drive on the left, this is not an easy task and I certainly wasn't up to it.

So we headed from Limerick to Kanturk, a journey of about 45 miles which takes a non-local over an hour. Roads on their maps look a lot different than when you are driving them due in large part to the aforementioned reasons. About half way through our drive we were convinced we were lost so I started looking on my phone. We were still going the right way, there were just several ways to get there. After going

through a handful of tiny, ancient towns we arrived in Kanturk. This town looks very old, with hardly a straight street and very quaint with narrow streets, old colorful buildings, row by row, small shops downtown including a meat market where we stopped for directions to Allowdale. The butcher didn't know Anne and Liam but said the vegetable man would know. So the three of us traipsed across the narrow main street to the booth where the vegetable man was selling produce. And yes, I felt like we were now in a James Herriot novel. He had to think about it for awhile but finally came up with some directions for us which we sort of understood.

This time only one wrong turn and some back-tracking and we were finally at Allowdale Herefords. I just love driving into a place and there are beautiful Hereford cattle by the sign. This was the place!

We were greeted by Anne, closely followed by two rambunctious Jack Russell terriers. Liam was on the phone but soon made himself available. The four of us visited for about an hour just like long-lost friends. We covered a lot of subjects, most of which were discussing U.S. and Canadian Hereford bloodlines and what the business was like in Ireland; Kathy and Anne had the finance industry in common and talked up a storm about that as well as the cattle. All the while we are watching

some beautiful Hereford pairs close to the house.

Fortunately in the summer, the days are long and we happened to be there on a sunny day so we ventured out to take a look at the herd.

Allowdale Herefords is a relatively new herd which has made a great deal of progress in a short period of time. Liam Philpott has farmed all his life and ran a herd of about 800 lowland sheep prior to getting into the Hereford business in 2006. The cow herd is currently about 85 cows. His family has been in Ireland since the reign of Queen Elizabeth I in the 1500s. The family originally came from England as British landlords.

A few years ago he met Anne Pounds, an international banker who lived in

London. They eventually married and settled on the family farm near Kanturk, County Cork. Anne's job has changed since then but it allows her to still be in in the finance industry as a consultant and travel back and forth from London to Ireland and also participate in the farm. Quite an interesting couple, farmer and financier, working together to make a great Hereford herd. Liam is also the vice president of the Irish Hereford Breed Society.

The couple started their cattle herd primarily to take advantage of their native pasture and reduce the need to purchase feed. Herefords were their choice because of their ability to convert grass to beef, calving ease, docility

and acceptance by the local dairy producers who are their main commercial customer. That area of county Cork is a large dairy area.

Liam said calving ease and calving weight is important to the dairymen using Hereford bulls.

Kathy and I didn't know what to expect when we got there but we soon found that the quality of the cattle was very good and we were impressed.

With a large amount of rain in Ireland it doesn't take many acres to run cattle and it is normally wet, so we donned muck boots and walked to the nearby pastures for the tour. Such a nice walk out in the pairs with two little Jack Russells following along, all the while getting the breeding details and history from Liam. He moves fast and talks fast but I was able to get a few photos as we went through the pastures. I didn't recognize the British and Irish bloodlines he spoke of but several U.S. and Canadian breeders and bloodlines were recognizable including XTC, Lilybrook, Hirshe and Star Lake.

We finally drove to a farther pasture where the sale bulls were. Doesn't take long with either of them driving. I'm sure they were wondering what took us such a long time to get there! The area started to look very familiar and Kathy and I realized it had been the same area in which we thought we were lost. Turns out we weren't lost after all. This part of the farm had been Liam's grandmother's. She was one of the first

medical doctors in that area in the 1930s and also had this beautiful farm.

When we pulled up to the bull pasture I was surprised that the bulls looked like those raised on our family ranch in Montana 5-10 years ago. It turns out that the breeding was the same as what we had a few years ago and that was Rambo.

Overall, the Allowdale cattle were really good looking, usable cattle with excellent conformation and good feet. They weren't huge cattle like other breeds we had seen around the country earlier in our travels.

Liam and Anne are enthusiastic about their future in the Hereford breed and study pedigrees and EPDs worldwide.

For these Americans it was a wonderful visit all the way around. We learned a lot and met some incredibly nice people. Thanks Liam and Anne for a great visit and tour.


As Americans visiting a foreign country and looking at Herefords, we quickly realized there are a lot of differences. Their markets are much different and they have a lot more history than we do but their show circuit is much different. They still like moderate to large sized cattle in their show ring. And as far as markings are concerned, excess white doesn't bother them at all. 




