NE, the Beesons are as recognizable and respected in cattle circles as they are in the community where Jack has made his home since 1950. They are nearly inseparable - you rarely see one without the other - and in the ways long-married couples, they can finish each other's thoughts and sentences and know as much about their spouse's family history as they do their own.

In the three years between that first meeting and their marriage on June 19, 1957, Jack says "I put 50,000 miles on my good Pontiac car" driving from Nebraska to southwestern Minnesota to see Bev.

A "Depression baby," Jack grew up near Garber, OK, the oldest of three children born to farming parents. His grandfather Beeson was one of the original "Sooners" who staked a claim on the Cherokee Strip. (He wasn't quite "soon" enough, though, as he ended up

hsner Family Rises From the Ashes

Residents of the Prairie Center Community north of Torrington, WY, are looking forward to 2017.

The fires are out. The blackened ground is covered with snow, and people's spirits have won out, as evidenced by George Ochsner, who exclaimed with a laugh, "At least it killed the grasshoppers!"

The ranching patriarch's attitude reflects the relief and forwardlooking attitude of his family five months after a raging prairie fire swept the Prairie Center community about 16 miles north of Torrington, scorching the earth and killing dozens of cattle in a 24-hour rampage that reached the edges of Sioux County.

While the Ochsner family, sons Rodney and Blake, and daughter and son-in-law, Dixie and Steve Roth, and their son, Rustin, and his young family, took the brunt of the damage, other community families suffered as well. The Ochsners' other daughter, Tena Baldwin, and her family live 12 miles north and escaped the property devas-

tation, although Tena received seconddegree burns to her hands, and singed hair, while fighting the fire.

The nightmare began July 11 when a blaze erupted after a smouldering fire from a lightning strike the day before was driven across country with winds as high as 58 mph. The homes of Rustin, Rodney and George were sitting in the path of the fire, and the families (continued on page 30)







(continued from page 1) when they were elected President, we then supported them. I guess I was also very upset that a known proclaiming Socialist in our primary election could get over a million votes in his quest to be President. (Socialism - a theory or system of social organization which advocates the vesting of the ownership and control of the means of production, capital, land, in the community as a whole.) I could not understand if these people that supported socialism really understood what it meant or if was just being social to support that candidate. People don't realize what the real socialism countries or communistic countries (they are somewhat similar in operation) have to offer you in life. In my many years in the cattle business I have had the opportunity to visit countries that operated under socialism, and some countries that had governments under communism. Some people in this country that love to quote their rights to our first amendment to the Constitution, when they disrupt, damage, or harm, people or property in the USA, could be rudely treated in other countries for doing the things they do in this country, under the banner of the first amendment. In a lot cases these people would be sent to a horrible prison and in some cases even shot.

I can remember in 1976, I went on what was called a technical assistance mission to Hungary through the American Hereford Association. At that time Hungary was an Iron Curtain Country under Russia. My main job was to integrate a huge Hereford purchase from the US into the vast area of the Hungarian plain. I was also asked for advice on cattle operations throughout Hungary and I had to evaluate and score every Hereford animal in existence in Hungary at that time. The great Hungarian people were being subdued by military might and force, but after a few days when they knew they could trust me, they told me about the freedoms that they once had. I was totally shocked when I was in Budapest and all the churches were bolted shut and anyone

who tried to get in one was handled in a severe manner. The people in Hungary at that time had food, shelter and some medical care, but not freedom to really do what they wanted to do, as we had in this country. One thing that was evident at the time, was that everybody worked very hard.

In my job I was worked from four in the morning until dark every night, as that was the work schedule. Young people all had a job, people into their nineties were sweeping the streets or cutting grass on the highways, there was no such thing as handouts from the government. On one of our trips between the state farms, I was quietly asked if I thought it would be okay to go by a store and get an ice cream cone, because they said without your approval, we could never do this. It was interesting at the time, because all the good beef that the Hungarians were developing had to be sent to Russia for their use, and the Hungarians were eating duck, chicken and turkeys, but no beef. I was constantly asked about the US and how we lived and what we could do, and in each country that I have visited outside of the US, with the exception of Canada, the people who we hear about hating us, and despise us, are basically the same people who are envious of us, and would love to live here.

It would be interesting to me to learn about all the ANTAGONISTS who like to riot about our election process, destroy property and even kill others, if they would be sent to live in these certain other countries, what their treatment would be, if they committed these types of crimes. I often think how many Americans, would think differently if they were to go live in socialistic or communistic counties, if they would have a different way of thinking about this great country that they were living in. When I came back from Hungary and we were making our turn around the pattern at La Guardia Airport in New York, as we banked over the Statue of Liberty, tears started to stream from my eyes with the thought of being back home in the United States of America. I am home, I am home!

In all my lifetime, all the changes in Presidential administration have not probably changed the life of the average American a great deal, but I think I personally became more convinced in this election the of ideas that Donald Trump stood for were the things that I thought were slipping away from our country. I felt extremely strong that the Constitution that has been the backbone of our country for over 200 years should not be attacked, as it was by some people. I also thought that the actions of some of our Supreme Court justices was wrong in not following our constitution, and making decisions based on their personal feelings rather than the laws of our country. I also felt that our government was making it extremely difficult for people to run their business with the bureaucracy, and overwhelming them with restrictions and paperwork. I am totally shocked that our national debt is at \$19 trillion and adding by the minute. To me, it is a staggering amount to think of a trillion dollars; it is unbelievable to me that our debt goes up by the millions each day.

In Montana, the government must balance the budget each year or the governing officials can be charged criminally. I think this should carry over to the Federal government. We as business people cannot have a negative balance in our business for very long or we are out of business. If the government ever has to go bankrupt, we are in a world of disaster. Give this some thought.

I was alarmed, and still am alarmed, that the basic center of the nation, can have such different thoughts and attitudes than the people of each coast have about the operation of the country. I can remember a few years ago, when I was in New York City riding the subway and I was sitting next to a black man, who was obviously a business man going to work. He seemed to pick up on something I said and asked me where I was from, I said Montana. He asked he how black people were treated in Montana," I told him that we treated people on what kind of people they were and not where they were from, if they are good people they get along fine if they are not good people they don't get along fine." He told me he thought that is how it should be and he would like to visit Montana some time because in New York things were certainly different.

I realize that I am probably preaching to the choir because most of middle America voted for this change in government, but it is a little difficult for me to understand why the voters from the West Coast and most of the voters from the far eastern shore have a totally different view than middle America. People that are not citizens should have to face the consequences for being in this country as they are breaking the law. I sympathize with many of the people in this circumstance, but if we are to be a great country we need to be a country in which the laws are obeyed. If we are to be successful to as Trump says, "Make American Great Again," we must pull together regardless of our political orientation. I was a County Commissioner in our county for 10 years and when I dealt with commissioners of other counties in Montana (as you probably know Montana is one of the largest states in the union!) many of them were of a different party. My opening remarks to these people would be that we need to forget our political parties and do what is good for our county and therefore our state. Once we got past the parties we were always able to solve the problems, this should also be beneficial for our American congress.

They all have tough jobs ahead of them and we the people must get behind them and unite the best we can. As John F. Kennedy said in his 1961 inauguration speech, "So, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country.' ΒB







(continued from page 1) outside Enid, about 15 miles from the tract he had wanted.)

In high school, Jack was active in the strong Garber FFA chapter that in 1944 was just the second chapter in the U.S. to get the prestigious Gold Medal. Jack notes that their main competition was the chapter in Chickasaw, whose instructor at the time was Andy Duffle (who went on to serve as youth director at the American Hereford Association).

As he grew up, Jack became interested in showing cattle. After high school, he went to work building concrete elevators and also worked for Honey Creek Ranch, a horned Hereford operation in Oklahoma. In the winter of 1950, he quit and went to Fort Worth to help show cattle for Jesse and Don Riffel, whom he had met at the American Royal.

It was at that stock show where he had the first encounter that would chart the direction of his life's course – he met Leland Herman of Hervale Farms. "Leland had the two best Polled Hereford heifers I'd ever seen," Jack recalls. "They both won their class at the National." Wanting to work with show cattle, he approached Leland about coming to work for him in the spring, then went back to work for the elevator construction company until he heard from him.

The summons nearly didn't come – Leland had lost his address. Fortunately, he remembered what county Jack was from and tracked him down through the county agent, whose daughter had stalled next to him at the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago.

At the urging of his construction boss, Jack quit that job and headed to Nebraska. After only four months on the job, he was drafted. After serving two years in the military, Jack returned to Hervale Farms to resume his position.

The second oldest of 13 children, Bev was born in Beaver Creek, MN, located 5 miles from South Dakota and 6¹/₂ miles from Iowa. Her father worked for a man who put draft horse studs on wild horses from Montana. Every winter, her father would break 200 horses and make them into teams to sell in the spring.

In 1936, her dad went to South Dakota and for \$26 bought all the machinery he needed to start farming, then moved the family to her grandfather's farm in northwest Iowa, where they stayed until 1943. Bev started school in Iowa, but graduated from Beaver Creek. School was a mile and a half walk, until she was 15 and got permission from the authorities to drive her and her siblings to school in a Model A.

It was during her youth that Bev developed a love for horses and started riding and breaking them. Selling them was another matter, because she held the opinion that "they're all my friends." The first horse she bought was a Quarter Horse/Thoroughbred cross from Montana that did fine on trail rides as long as it was in the lead.

After high school, she stayed home and helped on the farm. After a year of college, she taught at a country school near Tripp, SD – eight grades, with one student in each grade. It was soon determined that she had more of an aptitude for mechanics than elementary education.

Bev's father raised Milking Shorthorn cross cattle, then purebred Shorthorns. Most of their herd bulls came from Canada. One of their bulls, from Leveldale Farms in Illinois, was champion at the International. But it was a






shorter-legged bull from Fair Acres in Minnesota that was the real typechanger, getting the herd's frame size down to the moderate level that was more acceptable at the time.

When the Beesons married, Bev had

the dream of moving out west, buying land and starting a ranch, but Jack didn't want to. By that time, he had already started his own Polled Hereford herd with some heifers from Hervale. (continued on page 24)



The circumstances of that acquisition were the start of what Jack terms a "most unusual relationship" with Leland that lasted 27 years. A terrible snow storm had hit the area on the day of Hervale's sale, so several heifers weren't sold. Leland offered them to Jack, saying "you can work them out if you want to stay."

From then on, the JB cattle were run with and managed just like the Hervale herd and even the subsequent show strings had animals from both operations. The Hervale cow herd numbered approximately 150, with the Beesons owning an additional 25. When Bev came on board, she worked alongside Jack and also handled all the A.I. work for the farm.

"We have a lot of fond memories showing cattle," Jack and Bev state. One of their favorites is exhibiting the 1965 National champion female, Diamond Lil, in Springfield, IL.

The following year, Bev was named Polled Hereford Herdsman of the Year, the first woman of any breed to be so honored. The ceremony was held in Oklahoma City at the Cowboy Hall of Fame. Jack's folks lived there and accompanied them to the banquet – the occasion complicated Bev's normal show wardrobe, because, "I had to take a dress." She wasn't expecting to win and had kicked off her high heels, so when her name was announced, she suddenly disappeared under the table looking for her shoes while everyone wondered what had happened to her!

Bev was somewhat of a pioneer for women in the cattle show community.



"I was so honored. Men and women weren't really considered equals in those days, " Bev says of her 1966 Polled Herdsman of the Year award. "So for all the guys in the barn to think I was the one that deserved that award, it meant a lot to me. It still does."

She recalls that when they showed at the first World Hereford Conference in Des Moines in 1960 there were no shower facilities for women on the Iowa State Fairgrounds, so she had to go to the sheep barn to clean up.

Bev has also been National Pollette of the year and they received the 2000 Pioneer Award from the Nebraska Polled Hereford Association. Jack and Bev were also the South Dakota Hereford Association honorees at the 2008 Black Hills Stock Show.

But of all their achievements, having and raising their son, Jock, is their proudest accomplishment. Back in 1966, when Bev's hearing started to fail, she had a complete physical at Rochester. When she asked the doctors why she had never become pregnant, they told her that issues with her reproductive organs would make it impossible to ever conceive and advised her and Jack to look into adoption. They never did and in 1974 Jock was born, a testament, Bev says, to the power of prayer.

It's no wonder that he would grow up to be involved with cattle — when he was just a baby, he was strapped to his mother in a carrier as she led a bull through the National sale. In the 1990s, Jock was on the National Junior board, serving as vice president and then exofficio; won the junior speech contest in Tulsa and the senior speech competition in Kansas City. He also won both junior and senior showmanship during his career, then emceed the showmanship contest in Wisconsin.

Jock attended Northeast Nebraska Community College for two years, then went to the University of Wyoming at Laramie, where he met his wife, Brenda (who has a good eye for cattle, ac-

> cording to her in-laws). They now ranch near Crawford, NE, where they are developing a black Simmental herd.

The Beesons stayed with Hervale Farms until 1978, when they moved their cattle to their place not far away. Jock was about to start school and they decided they needed to be on their own. They started with about 25 registered cows and 40 commercial cows.

A tornado that came through in October 2013 took out many of the trees that Bev had so painstakingly planted and tended since they first bought their home place in the mid-1970s. The house, where they took shelter in the basement during the storm, suffered some structural damage but remained intact.

The strong work ethic cultivated in their youth – Bev was out fixing fence the morning of their wedding – remains to this day. They do all the work with their 45-cow herd themselves,



except for the rare times when they're away overnight and hire someone to do the chores.



They've always enjoyed working with young people and count as one of their special success stories a friend of Jock's whom they mentored during his school years. The young man achieved their mutual goal of showing his own heifer at the Junior National.

Like most people who have spent a lifetime in the cattle business, the Beesons have forged relationships with many cattle people over the years. Special friends include Bob and Marilyn Schultz of Da-Es-Ro Angus in Columbus Junction, IA; Paul and Berva Hinderager, Vaughn, MT; Doug and Judy Finseth of Bar Pipe Ranch in Alberta; and Alvin and Mary Kate Pawlitza, Hazlett, Sask. They also fondly recall Jim and Fay Gill; Alfred Meeks ("fine fella - died-in-the-wool horned man") and Joe Lewis ("ornery competitor but a good friend").

Reminiscing over the life they've built together, Jack says, "If I'd worked as hard as Bev, we could've made a lot more money," to which Bev responds, "But money isn't everything."

A heart attack last winter slowed Jack down some, but the couple has no intention of hanging up their cowboy hats any time soon. "We have the herd down to a size we can handle," says Bev, "so we'll just keep doing what we're doing."

When asked when they might retire, Jack quoted the late Otha Grimes, owner of Ogeechee Farms, who said he'd leave that up to Mother and Father -"Mother Nature and Father Time."

Bev's answer was more succinct: "When the Good Lord calls."

She holds a communications degree from the University of Illinois and worked for the American Polled Hereford Association writing news releases and serving as assistant editor of Polled Hereford World before leaving to raise their two sons. She is currently administrative secretary of the Iowa Hereford Breeders Association.





were ordered to evacuate. George and Ruby relocated to the Roth home about two miles north, out of harm's way, where they received updates.

All but one of the Goshen County fire departments responded to the fire. LaGrange remained in the southern end of the county as a safety measure in case an emergency arose elsewhere. Several Nebraska communities responded as well.

The families say they were blessed as the fire did not reach their homes, although they suffered extensive smoke damage that required some restoration. The fire came within a few hundred feet of Rodney and George's homes, and consumed tons of nearby hay stacks.

In one of the miracles of the day, the fire crept around large pieces of equipment in a pasture across the highway, and a metal building near George's home that contained trucks.

The blaze did take out calving facilities a few hundred feet north of George's home. All of those buildings are being replaced with updated facilities. Family members are rushing to finish them in time for calving that will begin in January. In addition to new buildings, 200 loads of dirt were brought in to cover the ash and trash

left after the debris was removed from the corrals. Miles of windbreaks will have to be replaced, both on the home sites as well as in pastures.

In spite of the devastation, the family intends to continue in their prize winning Hereford business.

"We're building for the future," Di-

xie explained, standing in the corrals, pointing to the new windbreaks and buildings. The main building, 232 x 48 feet, and partially insulated, will hold calving pens, space for a few vehicles, and an office.

"The main thing has been to figure (continued on page 34)

out what to do, and then do it," said Dixie, emphasizing their positive attitude for the future. "I think the new buildings are testimony to what we think of our cattle."


Hesitating a moment, she added that George has commented that he will never again see the place as it was, especially missing the calves romping in the corrals.

While it takes a lot of sweat and muscle to rebuild structures, it is a different issue when it comes to rebuilding the family's registered Hereford herd. As a result of the fire, 125 animals were lost. Some died in the fire, while others had to be put down because of fire injuries. The animals are buried on the ranch.

In the aftermath, in order to save many more head, 400 shots were given to those exposed to smoke, in an effort to reduce or eliminate respiratory

conditions. Veterinarians were brought in with experience in dealing with livestock under these circumstances.

Even with life returning to some normalcy, they remain alert for fire danger. Smoldering manure and silage created problems for several weeks after the fire, with the last one erupting in early September.

"We were lucky," Rustin Roth commented. "We had a two-inch rain about two weeks after the fire. That helped a lot."

George said that in order to solve the silage flare-ups, they took three feet off the top and four feet off the edges of the pits.

Corn bins were also a concern. Some of the metal bins were so hot, water would sizzle when sprayed on them. One had to be cut open, spilling grain onto the ground. About 2,000 bushels were damaged and buried, but the remaining was spread out and cooled for about a week. Paul Miller in Torrington provided space to store what remained.

Even though they are face to face with the destruction, and can't escape the memories, the Ochsners continue thanking their friends, and the strangers, who helped them through the crisis.

"People worked day and night," Blake said. "And we're so thankful for all of the (fire) trucks that came."

They estimate about 250 people helped fight the fire, build fence and clean up.

"We could never thank everyone," Dixie said. "I kept wondering 'Why are people doing this?""

She said they wrote 300 thank you notes, and are sure they didn't get to all who helped.

"At the time of the fire, and right after, everyone was in a daze," Dixie said. "Everyone was in a dilemma because so much was happening.

"The first couple of days, we just tried to survive."

To escape that dazed state and move forward, the family divided responsibilities. Each person took charge of a different area, such as cattle, hay, buildings, etc.

When the disaster hit, Dixie and Steve were in an airport, on their way home from Kentucky, when Rustin called to tell them about the fire. They received updates until they arrived home.

"That was worse than being here," Dixie explained. "You can't do anything to help."

In spite of it all, the Ochsners are thankful for the support they have received, and continue to receive.

They say that the experience revealed how far-flung the "community spirit" can reach. Two men, one from Kentucky and one from West Virginia, both regular hunters on their property, came out to help with the clean up. Two more hunters interrupted their time in the field this fall to help. Another time, George had a call from Colorado Springs, Colorado, offering pasture,

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and in a separate instance, a man drove up from Texas to help.

The greatest miracle of all is Rodney's recovery. He was extricated from a quick attack fire truck with 12 broken ribs, his pelvis broken in two places, and a mangled right ankle. Following several surgeries, he was dismissed from the hospital in Scottsbluff on Aug. 5, the day before his birthday.

During his month-long stay in the hospital, Rodney had three surgeries, acquired 300 stitches, and reports he was "one big bruise," black and blue all over.

Considering it all, Rodney said, "I'm just glad it was me, and not someone else. We're lucky no lives were lost."

Today, he is part of the Ochsner construction team, driving loaders, building fence, and doing other jobs required to rebuild the family's operations.

Unless you were aware of his injuries, you would not know that his ankle

The family is more than grateful for the firefighters who risked so much to help them. They unanimously and enthusiastically praise the firefighters, and especially Rick Teeters, a Lingle rancher and fireman.

"He's our hero," they all say. "He's a country kid with country common sense. He knew what to do, and when to do it."

"And he's been Dad's moral support," Dixie added.

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



Vernon W. Sanders

Vernon W. Sanders, 94, passed away on Friday, Jan. 6, 2017, following a series of health issues.

He is survived by his nephew Duke Herrero (wife Jill), nephew Mark Herrero and an extended family of cattle breeders and friends worldwide.

He was born in San Francisco in 1922 and graduated from Stanford University in 1947 with a B.A. in psychology. In 1948, Vern was married to Jane Prakel of San Francisco for 10 years. They had no children. During World War II, he served four years in the U.S. Army, retiring as field artillery captain, followed by five years in the Army Reserve.

His business career included vice president of Thompson Aircraft Tire Corp. for 10 years, and ultimately president for another 10 years. Thompson was a large military supplier following WWII with factories in California, Florida, New York and Belgium.

In 1960, Vern Sanders bought the first Polled Hereford cattle for his Oak Hill Ranch near Santa Rosa, CA. Oak Hill was successful with numerous championships in the early '60s, and in 1967, he bought property in South Central Montana he named Beartooth Hereford Ranch, where he began acquisition of Registered Polled Hereford livestock. After a reorganization dispersal sale in 1979, Vern became partners with manager George Ellis, and they continued the unprecedented success with numerous Superior Sire awards, Gold Trophy Dam awards and National Show Championships. Over the years, Beartooth became a force in the show ring with Premier Breeder awards in 13 of 16 consecutive National Polled Hereford Shows.

Vern Sanders was an innovator in record keeping and performance testing in an era when little or no records existed. He pioneered and created computer programs and systems that measured and tracked every stage of development of every animal he owned. Many of his innovations have become standards in Breed Association records and Purebred breeding programs around the world. He created some of the early Artificial Insemination protocols, and Beartooth was site of the first on-farm embryo transfer in North America in 1977.

Vern Sanders was a member of Big Brothers, past president of the Tire Industry Association, a member of President Eisenhower's Highway Safety Committee, past president of the Montana Polled Hereford Association, past chairman of the American Polled Hereford Association, and a director of the National Cattlemen's Association. He was a lifetime member of the American Legion and VFW, and a selfless supporter of Honor Flight. Following retirement he focused much of his time on Veteran activities and travel.

He was a downhill skier into his 70s throughout the Rockies and the Eu-

Craig is survived by his wife of 49 years, Nancy, his son Chad (Tracy Moran), his daughter Laura Butler



Four generations of Snyders have ranched along the eastern slope of the Black Hills near Tilford, SD. Clifford and Janice, Ken Snyder's grandparents, purchased the property west of Tilford 70 years ago in 1946. The young couple had been farming/ranching in the Sturgis and

since coming to South Dakota from Missouri in 1930. Janice's family had established a ranching operation in the Black Hills in 1907.

Janice's father, Enos Blair, the oldest of four brothers, was charged with finding additional property for the growing family. A newspaper ad and a recommendation from a friend brought the near 21 year old to the Black Hills from Northwest Missouri. A deal was made with family approval and in February, 1907 the Blairs moved by immigrant freight car to the Black Hills. Dry weather and hard times drove Enos and his family back to Missouri in 1914. Enos' brothers stuck it out in South Dakota adding on to their holdings.


In 1921 the Blair Brothers purchased the O. J. Hanson ranch east of Tilford. This deal included a herd of registered Hereford cattle. The Blair family, operating as the Black Hills Hereford Ranch, sold Hereford bulls until 2000.

The Black Hills kept calling Enos and his family. On December 24, 1929 Janice married the closest neighbor boy, a farmer, Clifford Snyder. Janice's parents moved to South Dakota again for good in 1930. Clifford and Janice followed that same year.

Hereford cattle were always part of



Clifford Snyder's business at the Tilford ranch. Cliff also milked cows to make a living. Initially the cows were hand milked, and the milk cooled in 10 gallon cream cans in a water tank. The Fairmont Creamery in Rapid City purchased the milk. Cliff and Dean, Ken's dad, gradually added on to the Dairy business. They grade A milked 60-70 Holsteins until dispersing the herd in 1966. Dean said milking cows made them get up early and they were then able to accomplish a lot in a day with an early start. Also the regular pay check was real nice compared to the cow calf business.

Dean and his siblings enjoyed showing Hereford 4-H calves. The Western Junior Livestock Show in Rapid City



was an enjoyable family event for them. Cliff and Dean had a reputation herd of commercial Herefords, selling steer calves to repeat buyers from Iowa and Minnesota. They also sold top notch Hereford bred heifers to many neighbors.

Over the years Hereford bulls have been purchased from The Black Hills Hereford Ranch, (Calvin and Bruce Blair), Baker Herefords and Hawks Herefords.

Today the Snyder Ranch consists of Dean and Kay, Ken and Ronda, Andrew and Tacy and Daniel. Ken and Ronda's sons Andrew joined the business in 2013 and Daniel in 2014. The ranch has grown slowly with purchased and leased property.

Snyders have been the permittee of the Runkle grazing allotment in the Black Hills National Forest since 1946. Today the family maintains 700 – 800 animal units on a year round basis depending on what Mother Nature provides for summer grass and winter feed. The herd is approximately 60% cows and 40% yearlings. Today the cow herd is about a third straight Hereford — not as Hereford as it once was.

Snyders market their cattle in most any way other than a bawling calf right off the cow, says Ken. "We market most of our steer calves as finished cattle through custom feeding, using feedyards in Nebraska or South Dakota. We continue to sell bred heifers and also have a share cow enterprise."
