Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, California and western Canada.

The Remington fire in north-eastern Wyoming was absolutely devastating to ranchers between Buffalo, WY and into southeastern Montana. In the end it, along with with other area fires including the House Draw fire and Constitution fire (by Gillette) burned over 350,000 acres, killed livestock and burned ranch buildings. Amazingly no human lives or houses were lost were lost but the toll on cattle was big and miles of fencing were destroyed.

"Sometimes a fire can go through, and the fences will still be standing, and it's okay, Rachel Adam told a Billings news agency. "And in a lot of cases, that is not the case. With this fire, braces are gone. Fences are laying on the ground and up along that way. Cows could go all the way to Wyoming if they wanted to. I mean, it's, it's seven to 10 miles wide and 41 miles long," Adam said.

When we first heard about the fires I contacted several friends to check on them. One said they didn't have fire on their place but it was all around them and they were fighting fire every day for their neighbors. One of those neighbors was almost completely burned out.

Hereford Ribeyes Popular at Dakotafest



From Pasture to Palate: Oklahoma Hereford Breeder Embraces Farm-to -Table Trend

Hereford breeder Mark Rubes offers a line of branded beef and caters special events in a 26-foot custom food trailer. In the future, he plans to build an event center at his Six Mile Creek Ranch located south of El Reno, OK. When Mark Rubes restocked his ranch with Herefords, not only was he paying tribute to his roots in rural Oklahoma, he was also building the foundation of a vertically integrated business that spans seedstock development to cooked and catered beef. "I loved being raised on the farm and

having that experience as a farm kid, with wheat, hay, cows, chickens and gardens," he says. "I remember all that, and I still do a lot of those things today."

When his dad passed away in 2012, the family's old commercial Angus cowherd needed to be replaced. Rubes saw a unique opportunity to differentiate himself while honoring the past.



"I wanted to bring back Herefords like grandpa and grandma had," he recalls.

Rubes is friendly and outgoing, with a mischievous twinkle in his eye and a six-inch-long salt-and-pepper beard he started growing during the coronavirus pandemic. But underneath his affable disposition is a razor-sharp focus on quality and adherence to the premise that anything worth doing is worth doing right.

Since getting into Herefords, he's been named breeder of the year by the Oklahoma Hereford Association and won some big-time catering contracts from corporate clients like Love's Travel Stops.

Selling a premium product became central to Rubes' life early on. His first job out of college at Oklahoma State University involved selling a top-of-the-line Gallagher electric fence charger, which cost five times more than the standard charging device.

"It wasn't your Walmart fence charger. It was expensive," he says. "But the grass could grow up literally into the fence, and the charger would dehydrate it."

To this day, he's a big believer in the product. "I have the same fence charger I got for my dad back in '89, and it still works today," he said. "The quality of the product is exceptional."

That same emphasis on quality is evident at Six Mile Creek Cattle Company, his boutique breeding operation south of El Reno, Oklahoma, named for an unmarked waterway associated with many fond childhood memories.

When he decided to get into Herefords, he turned to two old friends and fraternity brothers from his college


For SDHA it just keeps getting better and better being the perfect combination of providing excellent Hereford beef paired with oustanding member participation.

The ribeye steak sandwiches are cooked on a special grill at their outdoor booth then the sandwich making line goes to work putting the steaks in a bun and wrapping them. Manpower is supplied by SDHA members who volunteer to take part.

After many years of revising their system, it is definitely a win-win and the sandwich building line works like a well-oiled machine.

"We have the best volunteers an organization could ask for and they show up and pitch in," says SDHA president Matt Zens. Not only are these volunteers great, but they are Hereford producers that raise this product."

"It's so neat to see how much people look forward to these sandwiches every year!"

days at OSU, Robbie Schacher and Matt Sims, both well-known auctioneers with close ties to the breed. He bought his first 15 head from Coyote Ridge Ranch, in Colorado, and shortly thereafter, a show heifer from Hoffman Ranch, in Nebraska.

From there, his pursuit of high-quality Hereford genetics "became like an addiction," Rubes says with a grin.

He still has daughter Kassidy's first show heifer, Crackerjack, purchased 15 years ago. He now runs around 200 head of cows and sells 30 to 50 bulls a year sired by breed superstars such as T/R BPF American Classic 561 CET, owned by Bar A Cattle in Texas; BK Jet Smooth J18 ET, which fellow Oklahoman Jirl Buck exhibited as the grand champion polled bull at the 2024 Cattlemen's Congress; and EXR Bankroll 8130 ET, Express Ranches' reserve grand champion horned bull at the 2019 National Western.

Rubes went into the breed having heard the usual warnings about pink-eye and foot rot, but those concerns haven't materialized. Angus cows have those same issues too, he points out. Instead, he's impressed by how far Hereford genetics have come in the last few decades and by the breed's contribution to bone density and overall soundness.

"When I got into Herefords, I didn't know how popular they were," he notes. "I'm finding a lot of customers who want to run them on good Angus cows."

From Steak to Plate

With his focus on quality, Rubes is reluctant to sell any animal at the sale barn for a commodity price. That's how he ended up in the meat business.

"Everything's full circle with me now," he said. "I have my show heifers and bulls that I sell, but I also have a meat market, and I created a food trailer."

His breeding program includes around 20 registered donor cows that are flushed for embryos, which are then transplanted into commercial Angus recipients. The conception rate is around 60 percent. A clean-up bull runs on those cows, and the

resulting calves go into his branded beef program.

"We don't want to miss out on a pregnancy with those cows. The baldies that come out of that cross go into our meat market," he says. "So we are actually breeding our cattle for the quality of the meat."

The calves are weaned at around 600 pounds, run on winter wheat pasture until they reach 1,100 pounds and finished for 120 days at a local feedlot. They are typically 1,500 to 1,600 pounds when they go to slaughter.

Rubes has several processors to choose from, but mostly relies on South Canadian Meats at Thomas and Country Home Meats in Edmond.

"It might be hard to get processing in the beginning, but if you're a regular customer, they love you, and they take care of you," he said.

Marketing the beef has been a rewarding experience. He gets to know his customers and counts many of them as friends.

"We have a barn on the farm with walk-in freezers, and people buy it right off the ranch. These people are not coming to me for the price, they are coming for the quality," he said. "Nine times out of ten our meat grades out at prime."

Faced with excessive quantities of ground beef — a common problem for direct sellers — he invested \$75,000 in a 26-foot-long customized food trailer built by Custom Trailer Pros in Kansas City.

Since he started catering events, he hasn't had to worry about having too much inventory. Now he can barely keep up with demand. The meat company currently processes around 100 head a year.

"There's no lack of opportunity," he says. "It's just if your food's good or not."

Local county extension agent Kyle Worthington hired Rubes to cater a meeting for area wheat producers, paying \$26 a plate for a lunch of sirloin taco meat with beans and rice.

Finding local caterers is getting tougher, Worthington said.

"Catering is hard work, and it's hard to get good labor," he said. "It's something where you've really got to watch your input costs."

He said several cattle producers in the area have started marketing their own (continued on page 6)

beef, but Six Mile is unique for taking the product all the way to table-ready.

Rubes partners on the meat business with a friend and neighbor, Zach Wix, who also raises some of the cattle that go into the program.

"Zach and I like to cook," he says. "He's very competitive. But we both like it. The whole idea of the food trailer is to cook what we raise at the farm. That's why we call it 'from our pasture to your palate."

Next up, Rubes already has a rendering for a new event center he plans to build at his ranch that will include a full-scale commercial kitchen.

Both he and Wix have full-time jobs off the farm in the healthcare field.

For the past 23 years, Rubes has owned a home healthcare and medical equipment company that currently has around 150 employees.

His Visiting Angels senior care franchise was the first in Oklahoma. Now there are 800 of them spread across the U.S.

"That's my real money. That's what allows me to do the fun stuff," he said. "I have great people working for me, so I can usually slip out of the office if I need to."

Growing up, Rubes' parents encouraged him to get an education and seek a steady job while putting the farming second. His dad did the same, working for a local prison.

But, as he likes to say now, you can take the kid out of the farm, but you can't take the farm out of the kid.

With his mom's recent passing, Rubes and his wife Lori are getting ready to move from a house in town to the ranch. His sister, Debra, lives nearby.

Daughter Kassidy, who gained valuable experience showing cattle on the National Junior Hereford circuit, is now a senior at OSU pursuing a veterinary degree and working part-time for a clinic in the Tuttle area.

Rubes' busy life and ambitious goals have put him in position to pay tribute to a rural childhood he will always treasure, by continuing the tradition of raising food.

The fall female sale run is starting. It should be an interesting week in Montana. See you there.



Final Farewell...

Douglas D. Bennett

Douglas D. Bennett of Echo, OR passed away August 18, 2024, at the age of 91. Doug and twin brother Don were born May 8, 1933, to J.W. and Marie Bennett born on a cattle and wheat ranch in Winona, WA, the twins quickly followed the lead of their two older brothers Bill and Jack and the vision of J.W. and Marie continued.

The four boys were soon spending countless hours on horseback in the rough Winona countryside learning the registered Shorthorn business. With J.W. at the helm showing cattle took centerstage. The Bennetts started showing and garnering champions throughout the United States. It wasn't long before these young Bennett boys were headed to Chicago in boxcars to exhibit the Grand Champion Shorthorn bull. This will set the stage for Doug's life.

Doug graduated high school and served in the Navy for 2 years; in 1953 he married Gladys Hudson. With the GI bill and a growing family, Doug headed to Pullman to attend Washington State University. Upon graduation from WSU in 1960 he went on to manage Lehn Brothers Herefords. During that time Doug purchased his first registered Herefords. He returned to Washington State to earn a master's degree, teach animal science, and coach the livestock judging team.

In 1967 Doug had the opportunity to join Howard Stone and manage Stone Hereford Ranch. He was able to continue to build his private herd with a unique agreement he had with Howard Stone. Stone Herefords became one of the premier Hereford operations both in the show ring and production sales. Doug utilized total performance records (TPR) and developed young sires by testing in Stone's commercial herd and retrieving feedlot and carcass data.

Stone Hereford Ranch had many ROM champions. Stone had Grand Champion bull in Kansas City with the Royal Saint who sold for \$30,000 for 3/4 interest to John Mecon; he went on to be Grand Champion bull at Denver. Stone also had 2 Grand Champion carloads at the National Western in Denver.

Stone Herefords became the site for the All-American Hereford Field Day and brought together many top cattleman and youth from across the US. While Stone Hereford Ranch was thriving, Doug, Don, and Howard Stone established High Meadows Cattle Company in Wallowa, OR which Don would manage.

1976 brought the record setting dispersion sale of Stone Hereford Ranch with a cowherd selling for \$2.2 million. The highlight of the sale was SR Big Arthur H201who brought \$180,000 for ½ interest and sold to John Wayne and Louis Johnson of 26 Bar Ranch. On the conclusion of the dispersal, Doug & Don purchased Stone Hereford Ranch then

renamed it to Oregon Hereford Ranch. And... Doug's vision continued

In 1979, Doug expanded by joining Sam Friedman to form Lone Star Hereford Ranch in Texas. Lone Star was quickly on the map with 2 Grand Champion bulls at the National Western in Denver as well as 7 Grand Champion carloads, and 2 Reserve Grand Champion carloads in Denver. The show program was strong with several champions at major shows. Doug's mission was to

produce high quality herd bulls to sell in their annual production sale as well as in Denver. Lone Star was one of the first herds to ultrasound yearling cattle for ribeye, marbling, and fat thickness as criteria for selection. These bulls included Star Mark 300C (\$175,000 ½ int.), Star Mark Donald ET (\$50,000 1/2int.), Star Donald 288D, Denver Grand Champion selling for \$225,000. Then, Lone Star's 335F became one of ABS's top selling semen/certificates bull at over a million dollars.

Doug initiated many programs for youth which included the Texoma Beef Clinic and the Lone Star Heifer Futurity Show. The Texoma Beed Clinic brought over 700 participants to evaluate several classes of Hereford cattle. The Lone Star Heifer Futurity Show became a yearly event that provided an opportunity to showcase progeny purchased at Lonestar Hereford Ranch.

After the sale of Lone Star Hereford Ranch, Doug returned to his beloved Northwest and joined brother Don at Oregon Hereford Ranch. They dispersed the Hereford cowherd in the fall to devote more time to their 4,000 head feedlot. Not ready to retire yet, Doug and Don purchased an Angus cowherd.



They started selling bulls in Madras, Oregon with Greg Lechner forming many new friendships. In 2007 they sold the feedlot and a large portion of the ranch while retaining the main headquarters. In their final years Doug & Don reduced their cowherd to a few head and sold the headquarters to grandson Jordan.

Doug has also benefited the industry through serving in various leadership roles. He has served on the AHA Board, as president and director of the Oregon, Washington, N. Idaho Hereford Association (OWNI), as president of the Breed Improvement Federation (BIF) and as executive committee member of the Texas Hereford Association. He also won several awards including the 1994 Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture, Member of the Diamond Pioneer (an agricultural achievement award by Oregon State University), and was inducted into the American Hereford Association Hall of Fame in 2008.

Doug will be remembered for the profound impact he had on so many lives and all the friendships he made during his wonderful life.


Craig Andrew Jaton



Byron's Classics

Byron Bayers' Editorial from October 2007

The big news in the cattle industry this week has to be the report that the Canadian border is opening to purebred cattle.

Many people on both sides have anguished over not being able to bring their cattle down or for the Canadians to sell their cattle into the US and not be able to deliver the live animal to its new owner. The border closing had a devastating effect on the Canadian industry and I for one, am happy it is opening.

I read a very interesting article in the 52nd Herd Sire issue of the Canadian Hereford Digest this week. The article is about testing your herd for the Leptin gene.

According to the University of Saskatchewan Genetic Research, cattle with normal Leptin do not have the enhanced advantage for feed efficiency and carcass merit as do those cattle who carry a mutated form of the Leptin gene, either in a combined form or as a homozygous mutated gene. In fact normal Leptin can work against an animal's ability to feed more efficiency and lay on fat.

Cattle with the mutated gene tend to have slower metabolism and tend to eat more. The article went on to elude that over 40,000 head of feeder calves were tested in Canada this past year and some very large outfits were among the group. It was also reported that the cattle testing positive for the Leptin tt gene had a 3 cent lower cost of gain and finished two weeks sooner.

Hereford cattle have already proven they are the most efficient of the breeds but this new test would yet add more profit to the picture. Get a copy of the quoted issue and study the whole article as it is a very new approach to further efficiency and it claims to pinpoint your individual herd bulls or cows that may be more efficient. The cost appears to be reasonable.

I hope that you read the article on the front page of last month's Hereford America about the Canadian approach to marketing Herefords in Canada. Gordon Stephenson, the General Manager of the Canadian Hereford Association and his staff and the Past-President of the Canadian Hereford Association, Byron Templeton and his board of Directors have done a wonderful job of fitting together a plan to promote Hereford interest and sales, across Canada. The Canadian approach

could well be used by the AHA to further the promotion of Herefords in the U.S. The approach that I really liked was the idea of visiting each sale barn and every rancher possible to promote the image of Herefords and to dispel the myths that seem to haunt us. Many years ago the AHA hired a person to work the commercial trade in the U.S. but the position was vacated after certain segments argued that the money should go to other sections of the budget. That was an ill-fated move and that position was never filled again.

Some of our "reps" through the years did spend a lot of time on ranches, but those people are now gone and the practice is about vacated. I can remember Dwayne Dietz, who worked many years for the AHA, used to work a bull sale and then follow some of the bull buyers home and visit their operations. It was a great PR move and Dwayne would fit it into his schedule going down the road



to the next sale. I really like the Canadian idea of not going near a breeder or a purebred sale and staying with the commercial sec-

tor, because they are the ones that ultimately keep us all in the business. We had better know what the commercial people are doing and thinking!

Last week Pauline and I motored to Idaho to the commercial sale of Laverl Singleton, and wife, Patsie, which is held at the Idaho Falls Livestock Auction, each year. His entire crop of Hereford yearling steers and nonreplacement heifers are marketed in this fashion.

I have gone to the sale for many years and Verl almost always tops the sale with cattle of his weight range. This year again Verl topped the yearling steers with his nice group of Hereford steers.

Usually a local buyer buys them and they are fed in the local area. A different buyer bought them this year but they will be fed within a few miles of where they were sold. I was told they are usually sent to a Utah plant for slaughter. Verl is a very dedicated Hereford man who gets the job done well with his cattle. It was a long trip, but very enjoyable. The Hereford always sells better when the people at the auction barn will work with the seller. The folks at the Idaho Falls yards do work with Verl!

I was saddened when Dale Sand announced his resignation as President of the Montana Hereford Assn. a short while ago and announced he was leaving the Hereford business. It was a big loss to us from a personal standpoint too, as we had worked with Dale for five years setting up a fine herd near Power, MT. Dale is young, in his 30s, energetic, honest, hard working, and strong as a bull. He loved Herefords and the Hereford people. In a short time he learned the pedigrees of both polled and horned Herefords and how to care for and, show his kids the steer business.

He was given an award by the American Hereford Women last year (2006) as an outstanding young breeder and hadserved two terms on the Montana Hereford Associationn Board of Directors. He was the Co- Chairman of an outstanding convention in Great Falls in 2006 and was one of the group that put on the very successful Montana Hereford tour last year. Family pressures over his long work days and over dedication to the cattle were the factors behind his decision. Dale and his family have moved to Frenchtown, which is

iust west of Missoula, MT.

Those of us who have known them and worked with Dale will miss them. We wish you Godspeed in your new ventures!

Editor's Note: Sadly, Pauline, Byron, Laverl and Patsie have all passed away since this was written. They all loved Hereford cattle and knew how to raise good ones.






